Driver License Renewals Available

PIERRE — South Dakotans eligible to renew their driver licenses will have the opportunity to do that at the South Dakota State Fair.

The South Dakota Driver Licensing Program will be at the State Fair renewing licenses for three days during Fair week. In general, South Dakotans may renew their driver licenses up to 180 days before the expiration date on the current card. The Driver Licensing booth will have information on the documents required by federal law to obtain or renew a license, says Cindy Gerber, director of the Driver Licensing Program.

"If you want to renew your driver license or ask questions about any part of the driver licensing process, we would love to have you stop by the booth," Gerber said. "The staff at the booth will be able to respond to most questions on the spot, and they will follow up on any inquiries that require additional research."

South Dakota drivers can get their licenses renewed or can get a duplicate license at the Driver Licensing booth in the Expo Building on the fairgrounds. The booth is open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 3 and Sunday, Sept. 4. On Monday, Sept. 5, the booth is open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

No testing will be available at the State Fair location. People who need to take a written or driving test to obtain a new license are asked to visit a state exam center. For a listing of exam stations and hours, visit www.dps.sd.gov.

Here is a summary of the documents required for obtaining or renewing a driver license:

- One identity document, such as a certified birth certificate or a valid unexpired U.S. passport. (Note: If your name is different than the name on your identity document, you will need to bring additional proof of your legal name, such as a certified marriage certificate, adoption

document, or divorce decree. A passport will work, if the name on the passport matches the name on your current driver license).

- One document proving Social Security number. Acceptable documents are a Social Security card, W-2 form, SSA 1099 form or pay stub (which must include Social Security number and name)
- Two documents proving residential address. Acceptable documents include utility bill, credit card statement, pay stub, rent receipt, phone bill, transcript or report card from accredited school, bank statement, mortgage or tax document, homeowner or renter insurance policy. (A parent's proof of address is acceptable for a minor child.)

Disaster Recovery Center Opens in Knox County

NIORRARA, Neb. — A Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) remains open today (Wednesday) and Thursday at the Niobrara Rural Fire Protection District to assist those affected by recent flooding.

The site is located at 259 Spruce Avenue in Niobrara until 7 p.m. today and from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Thursday. The center is operated by the state of Nebraska, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

Counties designated for assistance to individuals are Boyd, Burt, Cass, Dakota, Dixon, Douglas, Knox, Sarpy and Washington. Flood survivors may visit any DRC location for assistance. Future DRC locations will be announced as they are scheduled.

Before visiting a center, people with flood-related losses should register with FEMA even if they have applied for assistance with the USDA, filed a claim with the

U.S. Corps of Engineers, received assistance from local voluntary agencies or have called the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) flood hotline to report their damage.

Register with FEMA by calling 800-621-FEMA (3362) or online at www.DisasterAssistance.gov. Help is available in most languages. Those with speech or hearing disability may call (TTY) 800-462-7585.

Persons affected by the floods also may apply for federal assistance through a web-enabled mobile device or smartphone. Visit m.fema.gov and follow the link to "apply online for federal assistance."

Have the following information ready when you call to register:

- Social Security number;
- Current and pre-disaster address;
- Description of losses caused by disaster;
- Contact information where

FEMA can reach you;

- Total household income;
- Insurance information;
- Banking information (including account number if you want direct fund deposits).

The Disaster Recovery Centers are staffed by experts from FEMA; U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) providing loan information for individuals, renters and businesses; as well as other agencies. They will explain disaster assistance programs and help flood survivors.

For small businesses, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. EIDL assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

SBA applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at disasterloan.sba.gov/ela.

Legislators To Show Cattle

PIERRE — Around 20 of South Dakota's legislators will try their hand at showing beef cattle at this year's South Dakota State Fair.

The third annual Legislative Showmanship Competition — a friendly showmanship competition among state legislators — pairs legislators with a youth livestock exhibitor from their district. The youth partner "fits" the animal, prepares it for competition and offers the legislator a crash course in livestock showmanship. The legislator then shows the animal in the show ring.

The top legislative showman will receive a gold belt buckle sponsored by First Dakota National Bank and have their name engraved on the "Legislative Showmanship Champion" traveling trophy (won

by Rep. Charles Hoffman in 2010), which will be presented on the Grandstand stage before the evening's performance by Ronnie Dunn. The winning youth partner will also receive a prize.

"This friendly competition is a great way for the legislators to understand the hard work that our youth put into showing livestock at the State Fair," Walt Bones, South Dakota Secretary of Agriculture said. "It also gives the legislators some bragging rights among their fellow colleagues."

The Legislative Showmanship Competition begins at 10:30 a.m. on Sept. 3 in the 4-H Livestock Complex. The competition is a joint project between 4-H, FFA and the South Dakota Department of Agriculture.
