credit for the award. He noted the contributions of his son, who set up the foundation, and his daughter for administering the funds. "My son started the fund before he passed away," Bill Hoch said. "He was inspired by good teachers at the (Bon Homme) school, and he was always donating to (the district)." Greg Hoch also provided financial support for South Dakota State University in Brookings, where he earned his pharmacy degree, his father said. For the latest project, Kortan will literally see the progress of the new fitness center from his office as it arises on the Tyndall school grounds. "The fitness center has been (in the works) the last two to three years. It will be hooked up to our auxiliary gym on the (Tyndall) campus," he said. "They are in the initial stages of pouring cement for the foundation. It's supposed to be done by November and will have the general fitness equipment and weights." The Hoch donations don't just pay for bricks and mortar, and they support the entire district, Kortan said. The scholarships benefit Bon Homme graduates, and the district can now offer free breakfast to all K-12 students, he said. The district enrolls 540 students at the Tyndall, Tabor, Springfield and Bon Homme Colony sites, he said. The donations have made a major impact in the classroom and in students' lives, said Bon Homme

science teacher Janet Wagner, also a Hoch family friend. "We couldn't do this with just tax dollars. It's like having Santa Claus visit you," she said of the donations. "At Christmas, you ask for things that you need and things that you want. Here, the Hoch family is able to answer both types of needs." The Hoch funds also care for the students' physical needs, Wagner said. "The fitness center has stations for weight machines and training, along with a wide range of cardio machines such as treadmills and elliptical machines," she said. The free breakfasts literally feed the students' desire for learning, Wagner said. "Bon Homme had offered breakfast, but you had to buy it. Now, it's provided free to all students and you see many of them eat breakfast every day," she said. The Hoch Foundation offers just one more example of a lifetime of philanthropy from the family, Wagner said. Greg Hoch gave countless donations and gifts to various school projects, scholarships, community projects and programs. Most of these were given with the request to remain anonymous. Upon learning of his cancer diagnosis, Hoch sought to see the various ways and places he could help his community. Greg's wishes to help his community were expressed to his sister, Jeanne, and with the help of the South Dakota Community Foundation, the Hoch Foundation was born. Overall, the Hoch Foundation has awarded more than \$500,000 to communities, institutions and organizations in South Dakota in the past five years. Jeanne Hoch, like her brother,

maintained strong ties to the Tyndall community and Bon Homme school district, Wagner said. Jeanne was the homecoming queen and valedictorian in high school. She received her bachelor's degree from SDSU and her master's and doctorate degrees from Vanderbilt University. Jeanne also studied two years at Heidelberg University in Germany on a full scholarship, Wagner said. Hoch, a German professor, has taught at Berea College in Berea, Ky., since 1980 and chairs the department of foreign languages. The Hoch generosity continued this summer, when Bill Hoch gave away \$50,000 from investments, Wagner said. "People were told to send in their names. Bill drew the names of 100 people, four names a day for 25 days, and sent them \$500 checks," she said. "Bill wanted to see the money put to good use. He received thank-you notes from people who said they used it to pay bills, purchase eyeglasses and go on vacation." Bill Hoch celebrated his 90th birthday this summer and was greeted by a large crowd of well-wishers at a community celebration, Wagner said. Bill thought of the \$50,000 give-away on his own, as his idea of a perfect gift to others. That spirit of giving has greatly benefited the Bon Homme school district, Wagner said. The school system has freed up its capital-outlay fund for other projects and has acquired things not otherwise possible, she said. "And because of Greg's insight, the (Hoch) foundation earns interest," Wagner said. "It's the gift that keeps on giving."

ure of educational success. That approach is very consistent with the Supreme Court's decision." A lawyer for those who filed the lawsuit was not immediately available Thursday to comment. The Legislature and the state's governors have been in a long-running fight over funding levels for school districts. South Dakota law has required that state aid to schools increase by the level of inflation up to a maximum of 3 percent each year, but Dagaard earlier this year proposed that state aid share in the 10 percent cut applied to most state programs to balance the budget. The Legislature found some extra money to reduce the size of the cut in school aid to 6.6 percent for the current budget year. The lawsuit sought a court ruling that the South Dakota Constitution entitles all children to a free adequate and quality public education and that the present funding system is unconstitutional because it does not provide all children with that. The constitutional requirement for public education does not specifically include the word "quality," but the Supreme Court held that a quality education is part of those requirements. "We hold that the South Dakota Constitution guarantees all South Dakota children a free, adequate and quality public education which provides them with the opportunity to prepare for their future roles as citizens, participants in the political system, and competitors both economically and intellectually," Meierhenry wrote for the court. However, the high court said the lawsuit failed to show a firm connection between spending and student achievement on test scores.
