Construction Accident Leads To Gas Leak

A construction accident Wednesday afternoon left a hole in a natural gas line and closed a portion of 31st Street, according to a local official.

Yankton Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles said a contractor for the Menards project caught the Mid-American Energy line.

"The line was marked for the construction crew to put in a drainage pipe under 31st Street (near Douglas Avenue)," he stated. "They dug it out by hand so they knew exactly where it was, but just to the north of that, there was a dramatic rise in

elevation on the line."

A backhoe caught the four-inch main at the higher elevation and blew a hole in it. Emergency responders received the call around 2 p.m.

"It took Mid-American about three hours to get the line shut down," Nickles said. "They had to dig out the line in about three places to get a clamp on it."

"The good thing is, there was no interruption in service to any commercial or residential area," he added.

However, traffic along 31st Street from Douglas Avenue to Francis Street had to be diverted for more than three hours, Nickles said.

management because they haven't come to grips of the emotional aspects of risk management. Ultimately, you have to decide you want to be a risk manager and not a speculator. And that's tough to do because you give up upside and you trade away some of your potential to get rid of the risk."

Swanson said the transition from marketer to hedger has been difficult for many industries, not just farmers.

"We can't get a lot of people in a lot of industries to do this because they can see the income they're going to get is usually not as much as they want," he said. "Once you've locked in your margin and go on to something else, 'would have, should have, could have' comes into play. Is it exciting to be hedged up all the time? No. But it lets you sleep at night."

"The way it is looking, a lot of people are going to be using the sand on their own property to fill in holes and things like that," he said.

Inmates are emptying the sandbags placed at the locations so a contractor can remove the sand when the sites close down at the end of the month.

The drop-off points are at the following locations:

- next to the filled sandbags at Dakota Premium Hay, 3704 E. S.D. Highway 50;
- the south end of West City Limits Road on the county right-

of-way; and

- the south side of River Aspen Road between Lexie Lane and Bison Trail.

In other business Wednesday, the commission:

- tabled a decision on whether to extend the deadline for completing the bike trail along Deer Boulevard. The contractor requested that it be given until Sept. 15 before it is charged \$500 per calendar day in liquidated damages. The project was to have been completed by Sept. 1. Commissioners unanimously decided to wait until their next meeting to make a decision on the matter. Commissioner Allen Sinclair was absent from the meeting;
- approved a permit for a short film to be shot along Chalk-

stone Road Oct. 13-15;

- was told by Sheriff Jim Vlahakis that the Aug. 18 hail storm damaged nine of his office's vehicles, three of which received severe damage;
- heard from a large contingent of residents who use 431st Avenue to cross the James River in the northwest part of the county. They expressed dissatisfaction with the county for not finding ways to avert the annual flooding around and over the road, which then leads to extended closures. They said nearby gravel roads cannot handle the traffic and make long detours necessary. The commission vowed to investigate the matter in the coming weeks and will attempt to have work done along the three-quarter mile stretch this fall.
