Celebrating Literacy Week In Yankton

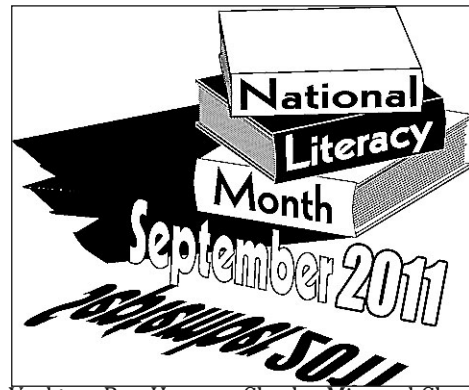
Children and young people are now back to school. But what about the 30 million American adults who cannot read beyond a third-grade level? This is also a perfect time of year for them to consider taking steps to overcome their literacy challenges.

That's why Adult Education and Family Literacy Week is being observed Sept. 12-18.

Do you know adults who steer clear of reading aloud, hide their writing from others, or commit everything to memory to avoid jotting things down? These are just some of the avoidance techniques used by many to find ways to hide their difficulties with reading and writing from coworkers and friends — even their own families.

"As children and teens go back to school, we also encourage adults in need of educational services to take the important step to simply ask for help," said Bev Calvert, program coordinator of the Yankton Area Literacy Council (YALC). "Literacy Week is just another opportunity for us to remind people that the YALC helps students of any educational background to improve their literacy, all year long."

The YALC, founded in 1987 and incorporated in 1988, is a volunteer-based organization that promotes literacy programs in



Yankton, Bon Homme, Charles Mix, and Clay counties. Its work is funded by United Way & Volunteer Services of Greater Yankton, various grants, and by community fundraisers, including the second annual "Spellebrate for a Good Cause" Scrabble tournament set for Jan. 29, 2012.

By belonging to ProLiteracy America and the South Dakota Literacy Council, the YALC is part of a network of organizations focused on improving adult literacy rates in communities around the country.

YALC's tutors work one-on-one with adults who need help with basic reading, English as a second language, GED preparation, math

skills, and more. This vital program grew its tutor/student numbers by 54 percent in 2010.

"Adults are just as entitled to an education as their children or grandchildren," says David C. Harvey, president and CEO of ProLiteracy, one of the nation's largest nonprofit organizations dedicated to advancing the cause of adult literacy and basic education. "Being open to receiving literacy instruction can transform any life — including the life of an adult. Literacy at any age also has the power to transform families and whole communities."

ProLiteracy advocates on behalf of adult learners and the programs that serve them, provides training and professional development, and publishes materials used in adult literacy and basic education instruction. ProLiteracy has 1,000 member programs in all 50 states and the District of Columbia, and works with 50 in-country grassroots organizations in more than 30 developing countries. SDSU Extension Offers AnswerLine

BROOKINGS — For decades South Dakotans have come to rely on their local Extension Educator to answer their family and consumer science questions. Today when consumers have questions related to food safety, cleaning tips, or balanced nutrition they have an additional tool they can use to find answers - AnswerLine.

AnswerLine is a toll-free number that connects consumers with Extension specialists dedicated to answering questions and directing consumers to research-based resources.

"This is a one-stop-shop with immediate answers to family and consumer science questions," said Joan Hagerfeld-Baker, Extension Food Safety Specialist and acting program leader for South Dakota State University Extension Family and Consumer Sciences.

"Through AnswerLine consumers have access to an office

full of specialists, along with data and resources compiled by SDSU Extension educators, faculty and researchers," Hagerfeld-Baker said.

The new service reflects the budget-driven restructuring of the SDSU Extension, which relies on communications technology to connect people with information.

"We've entered a new era in how we help answer consumer questions," said Hagerfeld-Baker, of the service which will fill the void left Oct. 21 when many local extension educators will be relocated to eight regional centers throughout the state.

She adds that AnswerLine provides access to services in additional specialty areas of family and consumer science.

"AnswerLine will provide consumers with an expanded library of resources."
