"He's in the fight for his life," he said. "He just went back up to Sioux Falls for an aggressive round of chemotherapy." To help cover medical costs, family and friends are holding a benefit for Austin Saturday.

"Austin is so bent on being a firefighter when he grows up that when we were going around looking for donations and things like that, we went to the fire department, hoping they could spread the word for us," said Casey Sloan, a family friend and one of the coordinators for the benefit. "But they went above and beyond that." The fire department first con-

tributed by hanging a banner advertising the benefit on one of its trucks during the Riverboat Days parade. Then, last Sunday, four firefighters visited Austin to give him his special gift.  • Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara announced today that about 40,000 additional regular Army troops would be sent to Europe, "in the immediate future." Most of them will go to Germany to strengthen combat because of forces in the Soviet Union's threat to West Berlin.
 • School and child care institutions will provide a market for more than 5 per cent of the nation's annual fluid milk consumption. This federal assistance is designed to help provide larger markets for dairymen and to improve diets of school children.
