

Street Closure Announced By City Of Yankton

The City of Yankton has announced that 31st St. from Highway 81 to Peninah Street will be closed the week of Sept. 12 to allow for the installation of an asphalt overlay and lane striping. No through traffic on the street will be allowed during the project. Access for adjacent property owners will be provided. The general public is asked to utilize the detour route that is provided, or an alternate route to circumvent the project area.

J.O. Archery Development Program Offered

Junior Olympic Archery Development (JOAD) is a program of USA archery that is designed to teach archery to young people, over a series of classes taught by a certified archery instructor or coach. JOAD offers both recurve and compound archers the opportunity to learn range safety and proper shooting technique in an environment that also fosters focus, increased self-confidence, and team building skills.

JOAD is open to any youth archer aged 8 to 20 and is designed to grow with the youth archer. Introductory JOAD classes teach the fundamentals of proper shooting form; as the young archer develops, they will learn more advanced techniques.

Both recurve and compound bows are used in club activities and in tournaments. JOAD archers who use a compound bow can train to compete in local and regional tournaments, and can earn a seat on a youth world team to compete in other countries representing the United States on behalf of USA Archery.

Recurve archers can compete likewise, with the added benefit of being able to use their recurve bow to try out for a spot on the US Olympic Archery team which is selected and managed by USA Archery.

Whether your child's interest is purely recreational or an Olympic, Paralympic or World Championship dream, USA Archery's JOAD program is tailored to help the young archer achieve their goals.

Classes will be one day a week offered on the following days and times:

- Tuesday or Thursday, Sept. 13-Oct. 27: 4-6 p.m.
- Monday or Wednesday, Sept. 12-Oct. 26: 5-7 p.m.

Class size is limited to 20. There is a cost for the classes.

To participate in JOAD, an archer will have had to already been in ASAP, a Basic Archery Course or have attended a summer archery program at our facility.

Old Part Might Save The Day For Old Car's AC

Dear Tom and Ray:

I drive a 1994 two-door Honda Accord (140,000 miles or so) with a lot of personality. One of her "quirks" is that she doesn't have a functioning air conditioner. I personally don't mind, but I have a dog, and I need to take his health into consideration when taking him in the car with me during the summer months. A few weeks ago, I had to make a two-hour trip on a Friday evening in 95-degree heat, and, being concerned that my dog would suffer heatstroke, I tried an alternative AC system. I filled a 4-quart Styrofoam cooler with water, froze it overnight, put it on the passenger floor of my car and then installed a cigarette-lighter-powered fan to blow across the top of the ice. Not surprisingly, this didn't work well. After an hour and a half, all of the ice had melted. And when I hit stop-and-go traffic, the water sloshed and spilled all over the car. While amusing, neither myself nor my dog felt this to be a viable option to use in the future. I know the car is old. The driver's-side automatic lock is starting to malfunction, the driver's-side automatic window sticks and I just spent money on it for engine and brake repairs. At this point, is it worth having the AC fixed? Are there alternative, cheaper options for cooling down the car that I have not considered? At this point, I cannot afford car payments, and buying a new car is not an option. — Emily

RAY: Wind and water are the traditional alternatives to air conditioning. When water or mist is combined with a breeze, it evaporates off your skin and makes you feel cooler. But as you've seen, that's messy.

TOM: So, the first thing you should do is find out WHY your air conditioner isn't working. You may just have a slow refrigerant leak.

RAY: If that's the case, you can get the system charged up for \$125 or so, and it might last you a couple of months, or even longer. In which case, you can do that once and have a whole summer's worth of air conditioning.

TOM: And if the leak is coming from a hose, or something easily fixable, you could fix it and recharge the system and be good

for several summers — if the rest of the car lasts that long. So it's worth asking a good mechanic to test the system for you and at least give you a diagnosis.

RAY: If one of the expensive AC parts has failed, like the compressor or evaporator, then you're talking \$800 to \$1,000 or more to have the new part installed.

TOM: But remember, you don't need a new part. After all, every other part on the car is 17 years old! So once you have a diagnosis, you should call a local junkyard and see if it has the part you need.

RAY: The compressor is the part that fails most often. And every car taken apart by a junkyard has the AC compressor removed. So they have tons of them. A used one probably will cost you about \$100 for the part, and then you'll have to pay someone a few hundred bucks to install it for you and charge the system. It's risky, because if the used compressor is no good, you can't get the labor cost back. But since you're desperate, it's probably worth a try.

TOM: Yeah, it's worth trying to fix this, Emily. Especially since you say a new car is not in your future. Your dog'll be much happier, and you'll probably recoup your investment twice over with the money you save on dry cleaning. Good luck.

DHHS To Consider Changes To Public Health Regs.

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is holding hearings on proposed changes to public health licensure regulations on Friday, Sept. 16, in the Nebraska State Office Building, 301 Centennial Mall South, Lower Level, Conference Room A, in Lincoln.

- Public Hearing at 8 a.m. CT: The DHHS Division of Public Health is holding this hearing to accept comments on proposed regulations related to the licensure of physical therapists and certification and supervision of physical therapy assistants.
- Public Hearing at 10 a.m. CT: The DHHS Division of Public

Health is holding this hearing to accept comments on proposed regulations related to the licensure of chiropractors/chiropractic physicians.

The proposed regulations for both hearings will reflect the provisions of the Uniform Credentialing Act, including:

- New and revised definitions and processes;
- Continuing competency requirements;
- Grounds for discipline, acts considered unprofessional conduct, and administrative penalty for practice without a credential.

The proposed regulations also require lawful presence in the United States

Anyone may attend and comment at a hearing or submit comments in writing. Written comments will be given the same consideration as comments made in person. Written comments must be postmarked or received by 5 p.m. CT Sept. 18 and should be sent to DHHS Legal Services, 301 Centennial Mall South, P.O. Box 95026, Lincoln, NE 68509-5026, fax 402-742-2382, or e-mailed to DHHS.RulesandRegs@nebraska.gov. Copies of written comments and names of persons submitting them will be available after the hearing from DHHS as above.

Public Session To Be Held On Federal Assistance For Flooded Businesses

PIERRE — The State of South Dakota, in cooperation with the South Dakota Retailers Association, the local Economic Development offices, and the Pierre Area Chamber of Commerce, will host a public question-and-answer forum in Pierre next week about potential federal assistance for businesses affected by Missouri River flooding.

The meeting will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 14, from 2-3:30 p.m. in the Pierre Area Chamber of Commerce meeting room.

"I encourage all businesses that have experienced or may experience any amount of flood impact to attend this forum and learn about assistance they may be eligible to receive, if any," said Gov. Dennis Daugaard.

The meeting will feature a panel of representatives from the Small Business Administration (SBA) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), as well as state officials from the Department of Labor and Regulation, and the Governor's Office of Economic

Development. Time will also be available for questions from the audience about financing, applications, or federal programs.

All businesses affected by the flood should visit the SBA website (SBA.gov/disaster) to view available programs in advance of the Sept. 14 meeting.

Many programs exist for businesses that have suffered physical damage or have suffered lost revenue or other financial impacts resulting from the flood.

Local officials in Dakota Dunes, North Sioux City, and Yankton may schedule similar meetings. Dates and times for southeast South Dakota meetings have not yet been finalized.
