down one of the three generators, was the influx of debris caused by the flooding, Becker said.

"We get our cooling water for the turbines from the lake," he said. "There was a lot of big debris coming down, a lot of wetland material like cat tails and what not. And then there was debris even smaller than that, which was floating from the top to bottom on the lake. A lot of that would get into our cooling water intakes in the power plant. We have two water intakes, with ... strainers that strain out the material so it doesn't get into the turbines. Generally we clean them a couple times per year. This summer, the debris was so heavy, we couldn't bring in enough cooling water to cool all three units. Instead of having to clean those strainers a couple times a year, our people were having to clean them three times per day."

The impact on the dam's hydroelectric output was dramatic. Becker said the dams were operating at only about 25 percent of capacity all summer.

"When we have a high level of water like this, we generally produce in the order of a 115 megawatts at an instant of time, which is enough for roughly 75,000 people," he said. "We were more in the 25-megawatt range this summer."

As the releases have declined, Becker said, output has increased.

"It has started to creep up now that our releases have gone down," he said. "I am estimating that we have gained about 7-8 feet of head back since our releases have gone from 160,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 90,000 cfs. We will have no problem with this in the future once we get back to higher head and cleaner water — and honestly, our water supply is significantly cleaner now than it was. We expect to get back to full generation."

Becker said releases at Gavins Point are scheduled to start coming down again Sunday. The plan now is for the releases to go down 5,000 cfs every other day, reaching the corps' fall target flow of 40,000 cfs on Oct. 6.

While Gavins Point struggled with its hydroelectric generation, other dams didn't, Becker said.

"Overall, on the six dams it has been a big year for power on the dam," he said. "Gavins and Big Bend (Dam) don't store much water, where the others do have a huge capacity. So, where we had reduced head, they had extra. I don't believe they have had the cooling water issues that we have had either."

Because of one of the generators being down this summer, crews were able to take advantage of some maintenance issues with the third generator, Becker said.

He added that the credit for the amount of energy the Gavins Point Dam power plant was able to produce goes to the staff of the facility.

"It just was not a real high producing power year," he said. "A real credit to our staff for keeping those units running. Plus (they came up with) the solution to change the cams, which hadn't been done for decades. So credit them for remembering we had that capability."

even the Great Plains. He was working in Kenosha, Wis., in 1992 when the WNAX general manager at the time offered him the job as sports director for the station and its five-state coverage area.

"I had been thinking of a change, but my attention was on Chicago or Milwaukee," Imming said. "But they needed a play-by-play announcer for SDSU football and men's basketball, and I liked the idea of working full-time sports and doing college athletics."

Imming quickly found the SDSU coverage to his liking. He developed strong relationships within the Jackrabbit program, which helped him rapidly master the learning curve.

"I was quick in getting to know the people, the athletic directors, the coaches," he said. "They were so helpful and made me part of the family."

That camaraderie has continued with the Jacks' move to Division I, Imming said. "When you are D-I, especially at the big schools, the coaches aren't always as readily available as they were at the D-II level," he said. "But the SDSU coaches and staff have remained really accessible. They give of their time and interviews, which isn't always easy for them to do."

Head football coach John Stiegelmeier commended Imming's work and trustworthiness. "It has been a blessing to have Steve literally be a part of our team," Stiegelmeier said. "He's been a great friend and a great professional in painting the picture of Jackrabbit athletics and, specifically, Jackrabbit football. We're going to miss him."

Men's basketball coach Scott Nagy echoed those sentiments. "Steve has done probably 99 percent of the games I've coached here, and although I've not heard one of them, I have had countless people tell me what a great job he's done and how good he is at his job," Nagy said.

"I know there have been many instances when I didn't make his job easy. He has been a credit to men's basketball and football at South Dakota State University, but more than that, he has helped advance the message of our entire university."

SDSU honored Imming during halftime of the football season opener against Southern Utah. He was presented with a game helmet, signed by Stiegelmeier. The helmet contains the message, "Steve, You MAD, God Bless, Stig."

Was Imming angry at some point? "No, MAD stands for 'Made A Difference,'" he said with a chuckle.

The Southern Utah game marked Imming's only appearance on the SDSU sidelines during his tenure.

"Usually, I work the booth for football games and am distant from the action," he said. "But here, I was able to see and feel the intensity of the players and coaches on the sidelines."

fuel and liquid petroleum gas. It would be the first new U.S. oil refinery built since 1976.

The project would include a power plant that produces electricity for the refinery. It would use a byproduct of the refinery process, solid petroleum coke, which would be turned into gas and burned to produce electrical power.

Hyperion contends the refinery would be a clean, modern plant that would use the most advanced, commercially feasible emission control technology. The company said the project would hire about 4,600 people during construction and have about 1,800 permanent employees after it begins operating.

The Sierra Club and two local groups, Save Union County and Citizens Opposed to Oil Pollution, argue the refinery could emit too much pollution and hurt the quality of life in the rural area.

Board member Timothy Johns said he doesn't accept the argument that the project has been delayed by a sluggish economy because the oil industry appears to be in good shape. The board then approved language finding that the construction delay also was justified by the court appeal involving the original permit and new national air quality standards for some pollutants.

"To me, it's an excellent project and should go forward," Johns said of the proposed refinery.

are two very professional people," Oster said.

The landscape has changed dramatically for the WNAX coverage, with the break-up of the North Central Conference and many members moving to Division I.

But what's old is new again, as former NCC members SDSU and North Dakota State are members of the Summit League, and the University of South Dakota and the University of Nebraska-Omaha are joining the conference.

The Summit League doesn't offer football, so SDSU and NDSU compete in the Missouri Valley Football Conference, while USD is joining the league.

"I hated to see the (NCC) break up, but it's good to see many of the members come back together and play as D-I schools," Imming said.

LOOKING BACK, LOOKING AHEAD

With his retirement, Imming looks back fondly at many memorable moments.

He recalled the 1996-97 season with the Division II regional men's basketball final at Frost Arena on the SDSU campus. The host Jacks avenged the previous year's loss in the regional finals — and headed to the Elite Eight — by defeating Fort Hays State of Kansas in front of a packed, raucous crowd.

"That crowd was the most electric that I had seen," he said. "You would like to have that crowd every night."

Another emotional moment came during the D-I era, when the 2006 football team staged a dramatic fourth-quarter rally — going for a two-point conversion at the end — to defeat host Cal Poly 29-28, Imming said.

The game did contain lighter moments, Imming said. Cal Poly didn't have room in its press box, so it reserved tickets among its home fans for the visiting radio announcers.

"We were working the game, and a couple came up to us with tickets for our seats," he said. "We had to tell them that they couldn't have the seats because we were sitting there."

Lightning struck twice, as the first couple's tickets were refunded but accidentally resold. Imming and Oster were forced to turn back another pair of fans.

Then, the WNAX announcers found themselves in enemy territory for the game's dramatic finish.

"We were sitting in the middle of the (Cal Poly) crowd, that was roaring when their team was ahead," Imming said. "Then it became dead silent when SDSU rallied and we were the only two getting loud."

Looking ahead, Imming sees a bright future for SDSU athletics.

"Those who were against the move to D-I said South Dakota kids wouldn't get to play and that coaches would be recruiting places like Florida and California," he said. "But the (Midwest) kids have flourished. The objection that it won't give South Dakota kids a chance has been proven wrong."

Imming foresees even greater success as the SDSU program reaches a decade in Division I. The teams already receive valuable national exposure that has benefited recruiting, he said.

Replacing Imming as the play-by-play voice of Jackrabbit football and men's basketball will be Tyler Merriam. Imming believes SDSU has found a good successor for him.

"I have worked with Tyler, and he has a passion for the Jackrabbits," Imming said. "It's not like it's somebody new where you have to explain SDSU to him. And the fans are already familiar with him."

Imming expressed appreciation for the fans' support and their comments and suggestions, whether by email or on the sidelines.

"It has been a privilege to be the play-by-play voice of Jackrabbit football and men's basketball for the last 19 years," he said. "I'm looking forward to continuing my relationship with the Jackrabbits as a fan by tuning in and making it up to some games."
