# Neb. Flood Victims Find Mess Of Mold, Mud In Homes

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb. (AP) — Many people returning to their homes as Missouri River flooding subsides are finding a mess of mold, mud and debris.

Marilyn Roueche left her house along the river in Plattsmouth on June 8, taking most of her family's belongings. She and her husband, John Adkins, returned earlier this month to find toxic mold on the walls and ceiling, cupboard doors falling off and 7 feet of water and sewage in their basement.

The couple told the *Lincoln Journal Star* that the house appears to be a total loss but they're waiting for the insurance company to make a decision.

"It's going to be condemned," Adkins said. "I don't think there's any way we could live in it."

Thousands of acres along the Missouri River in eastern Nebraska, western Iowa and other states have been flooded since June because heavy spring rain and substantial mountain snowpack generated massive amounts of water. In recent weeks, the river

has receded back into its banks in many places. Flood damage was also recorded in places along Nebraska's North Platte River this summer.

The state has identified 1,164 homes that have been damaged by flooding this year, most along the Missouri River.

Dave Haldeman, an administrator for the state Department of Environmental Quality, said it's unclear how many will have to be demolished. He said it'll be up to the owner to decide what to do with the property.

"Cleaning up all of this will probably carry over into next summer," Haldeman said. "I don't think it will be this fall. It will be a longer cleanup process than probably what you would anticipate."

Haldeman said owners could burn condemned property after removing asbestos, hazardous materials, furniture and household items, but he considers that to be a fallback option. The department prefers owners to tear down structures and have the debris hauled away.

## Shots Fired In Sioux Falls Lead To Arrest

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Gunshots fired in Sioux Falls early Sunday morning led police to arrest a man on several charges, including aggravated assault.

KELo-TV reports that police pulled over 37-year-old Steven Michael Jedlicka's vehicle after receiving reports of a man firing a handgun outside a residence.

Police say Jedlicka was involved in a domestic disturbance and followed his girlfriend outside of the home when he fired three shots into the air.

Officers recovered a handgun at the residence. Nobody was hurt.

Jedlicka also is charged with reckless discharge of a firearm, possession of a firearm while intoxicated and drunken driving.

## Postal Service Could Ax 5 Neb. Mail Centers

NORFOLK, Neb. (AP) — The U.S. Postal Service could close five mail processing centers in Nebraska to save money.

The postal service said Thursday that it was studying operations in Alliance, Grand Island, Norfolk, North Platte and west Omaha.

If the centers are closed, mail now processed through the Grand Island, Norfolk and west Omaha centers could be sent to the downtown Omaha center, Brian Sperry, a U.S. Postal Service spokesman based in Denver, told *The Norfolk Daily News*. Mail now destined for the Alliance and North Platte centers could go through Cheyenne, Wyo.

The Grand Island center has 66 employees, while Norfolk has 58, North Platte has 49 and Alliance has 8. It's unclear what would happen to those jobs.

Sperry said no decision has been made about the closures and the postal service is considering its options.

The postal service said it was studying operations at 250 processing centers nationwide for possible closure, as well as considering 35,000 job cuts, post office closures and other changes, in an attempt to save \$3 billion year. Under such changes, it would take an extra day for first-class mail to be processed and delivered.

The postal service lost \$8.5 billion last year and is expected to lose \$10 billion this year.

Mail volume nationally has declined by about 43 billion pieces in the past five years.

## Lakota To Be Taught At Sioux Falls Schools

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Sioux Falls high school students again will have the opportunity to learn the Lakota language starting next fall. The *Argus Leader* reports that district offered Lakota as a class in 2008-2009 but lost the teacher.

Tim Easter earned credits last year at the Lakota summer institute at Sitting Bull College in Fort Yates, N.D., and will be the new Lakota teacher. The classes will be taught at all high schools in the fall of next year.

Easter's grew up with a Lakota-fluent mother. He says the classes are necessary to keep the language alive.

Fewer than 6,000 of the 120,000 members of Sioux tribes speak the language. Most live in North Dakota and South Dakota.
