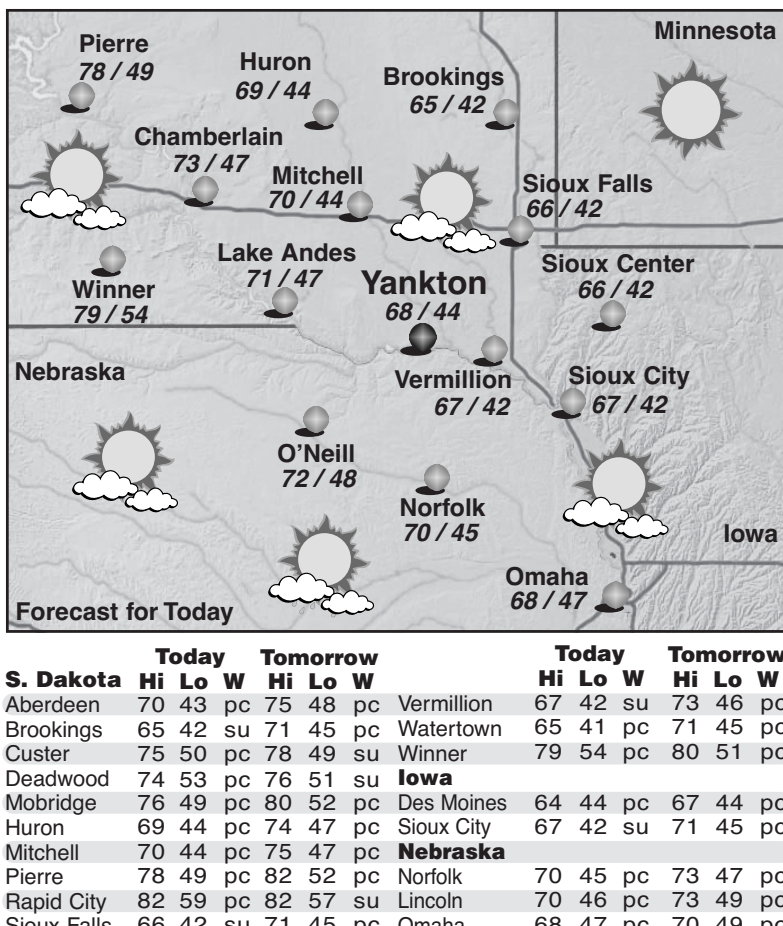

Free Educational Sessions On Long-Term Care Options Scheduled

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Social Services is hosting several educational sessions this fall on long-term care and the Long-Term Care Partnership Program.  
"It is important to understand what long-term care options are available for you and your family as you plan for your future care needs," said Kim Malsam-Rysdon, Secretary of the South Dakota Department of Social Services. "I strongly encourage families to consider a long-term care insurance plan certified by the Long-Term Care Partnership Program, which can offer additional protection for them and their loved ones."  
The Long-Term Care Partnership Program is a public-private partnership that offers individuals quality, affordable long-term care insurance without depleting their assets. The South Dakota Department of Social Services began offering free educational sessions on the program in 2007 to raise awareness about long-term care insurance and the benefits for South Dakotans.  
The fall schedule includes stops in several communities from September through November. Sessions will include basic information on long-term care, the costs related to it, how to plan for long-term care needs, what Medicare and Medicaid will cover and how the Long-Term Care Partnership Program can help. The educational sessions are free and open to the public. Each session is scheduled for one hour.  
The area schedule includes:  
• Sept. 27 — Yankton Community Library, 515 Walnut Street at 2 p.m.  
• Sept. 28 — Elk Point, Courthouse Community Room, 209 East Main at 2 p.m.  
• Oct. 18 — Parkston Public Library, 110 West Main Street at 2 p.m.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance Application Deadline Approaching

PIERRE — The Department of Labor and Regulation reminds workers and self-employed individuals in Charles Mix, Hughes, Stanley and Union counties that the deadline to file for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) is Thursday, Sept. 29.  
To be eligible for benefits, individuals must be unemployed or unable to do business as a direct result of the spring flooding that occurred from March 11-July 22, 2011.  
To apply for benefits, call the Unemployment Insurance Call Center at 605-626-3179 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:20 p.m. Individuals should specify their claim is related to the DUA spring flooding.  
Individuals will need their Social Security number, copies of their most recent federal income tax forms or check stubs, or documentation to support they were working or self-employed when the disaster occurred. The first possible week of compensation for DUA purposes is weekending March 19, 2011, and the last possible week of compensation is weekending Nov. 12, 2011.  
Re-employment assistance is available through the Department of Labor and Regulation local offices. All programs and services are provided at no charge. Detailed information is available at www.sdjobs.org.
