had missed annual yearly progress (AYP) by less than a percentage point in only one subgroup, keeping the entire YMS on level 4 status. The district appealed the state's decision; in reviewing the schools results, the state agreed that YMS had met all requirements.

"You should have heard the cheer that went up when I emailed the teachers once I heard we had made it," he said. "You could hear it down the hallway — teachers and students cheering when they got the news. That is why we (held) their celebration. What better way to celebrate the students and homecoming than with an assembly sharing the results."

During the assembly, Dvoracek also honored the students who had made the most improvement from year-to-year results.

"These students may not have the best scores overall, but they have shown the most improvement," he explained. "They worked hard to really improve their scores and they deserve to be recognized."

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Brachytherapy radiation treatment at Avera Sacred Heart Cancer Center reduces treatment time by five to six weeks for qualifying breast cancer patients.

Women typically have the option of choosing radiation instead of a mastectomy. Brachytherapy differs from whole-breast radiation because it treats only a small part of the breast, making side effects milder.

Traditional radiation takes up to seven weeks. Brachytherapy takes five days. Just five days. That leaves a lot more time for patients to do what they love, with the people they love.
