**Library Announces New Lending Program**

The Yankton Community Library has announced that "South Dakota Titles To Go ... OverDrive" can now lend eBooks for the Amazon® Kindle. This announcement came from South Dakota State Library Electronic Resources Coordinator Julie Erickson on Sept. 22. "Kindle compatibility will allow public libraries to serve their readers and extend their valuable community role while providing an outstanding reading experience," said Steve Potash, CEO of OverDrive. "This addition helps public libraries accelerate their drive to become the first online stop for eBooks, where visitors can browse, discover and sample new and popular titles and authors in virtually all subjects." The process for borrowing a public library eBook for Kindle is similar to borrowing for other devices. Most eBooks already in "South Dakota Titles To Go ..." are compatible with Kindle, so users simply browse or search for "Kindle Book," check out a title with a valid library card, and then click "Get for Kindle." Access to the Kindle Book will occur at Amazon's website after signing in and selecting delivery to the user's Kindle device or any of the free Kindle reading apps. As with all eBooks and other digital content at "South Dakota Titles To Go ..." titles are available 24/7 and incur no late fees because they automatically expire at the end of the lending period. worries that people won't have jobs," says James Hamilton, an economics professor at the University of California, San Diego. "The news has not been good." And gasoline prices remain historically high. Gasoline has averaged \$3.56 this year, the highest yearly average ever. Americans have cut back driving in the face of high prices, but they are likely to spend more on gasoline in 2011 than ever before — close to \$490 billion, according to Tom Kloza, chief oil analyst at the Oil Price Information Service. Kloza says the latest drop in prices will stick around through most of the fall. And while that may only add \$20 a month to a typical com-

muter's wallet, drivers say it matters. Pat Wolf, 60, a retired information technology professional from East Lansing, Mich. responded with a "Holy Mackerel!" when he got a text from his wife Friday morning that said a station nearby was selling gas for \$2.98 per gallon. Wolf said prices in the area were \$3.49 earlier in the week and he had no hope that they'd fall below \$3. "It's one other thing in the back of your mind if you are deciding whether to buy some gizmo or other," he says. Aureleano Duran, a house painter in Dallas, gave the cashier at a Race-Trac gas station \$55 to fill up his red Dodge pickup Friday night, but the tank began to overflow before he shut off the nozzle — at \$49.21. Duran plans to sock away roughly \$30 a week in gas savings. "I'm trying not to spend a lot of it," he said. Then he excused himself: "I've got to go get my change."

of what it is. Every disability has a range," Jewell said. "If you're not up on what it is, what you might expect will be wrong. If you see someone in a wheelchair, you assume that person can't drive a car, but some do." It can be those preconceived notions that drive certain stigmas, according to Jennifer Trenhaile, senior rehabilitation counselor with Rehabilitation Services, which is hosting Tuesday's events. "The last time I saw Geri talk, she focused on the first impression people get with someone with a disability," Trenhaile said. "That can really be misleading, in many different ways. For a person like Geri, she doesn't know any other way." "We try to emphasize how important it is to understand what they're going through." Jewell, a native of Buffalo, N.Y., also appeared in such shows as "21 Jump Street," "Sesame Street," "Young and the Restless" and "Strong Medicine." She most recently starred in the HBO hit series "Deadwood," a 36-episode series that aired from 2004-06. Yet, it was a background in comedy that made — and still makes — Jewell a sought-after speaker. "I tell people all the time that just like it's easier to take a spoonful of a medicine with a spoonful of sugar, it's easier to take a serious message with some humor," Jewell said. "You have to have a sense of

humor, otherwise you can't enjoy life." That message follows the continuing trend of the local NDEAM committee, which assists people with disabilities in obtaining and maintaining employment goals, Trenhaile said. "We just want to continue to not only bring awareness, but show that people who have limitations in their life can overcome them and provide wonderful things," said Trenhaile, who will follow Jewell's speech on Tuesday with a history of NDEAM presentation from 8:45-9:30 a.m. "We need to focus on that more than what they struggle with." Jewell detailed her struggles with cerebral palsy and the dis-

crimination she faced in Hollywood in her memoir "I'm Walking As Straight As I Can," which was released this spring. Jewell's notoriety during the past 30 years has provided an inspiration to people with all kinds of disabilities, Trenhaile said. "Any time you have someone who's broken through some barriers and brought some awareness, it's naturally someone they look up to," she said. The Oct. 4 schedule of events will also include a speech by Page Hudson of Dakotalink, which provides consultation, installation and disability training services for businesses and organizations. "With all the technology and new ideas out there, you have to be severely limited to not contribute anything in the workplace," Trenhaile said. And that is exactly what Jewell will touch on in her speech. She will also hold a brief book signing before traveling to Mitchell and on to Brookings for similar speeches — she estimated it will be six groups in two days. "I hope to let people know that we can all overcome our adversity and obstacles, as long as you believe in yourself," Jewell said. "I challenge people to look at the same thing in different ways. "Hopefully they have a wonderful time," she added. "I know I will."
