"We've got a dock in over at the training dike," he said. "As the releases back down, we'll try to get the dock in on the Nebraska tailwater side, too. Early on in the season, there may not be a dock and access may not be as easy, but the ramp will be open."
Schelhaas estimated that under normal conditions, about half of the paddlefish snagging takes place from boats and about half from the bank.
"I've heard both sides," he said. "Some people say you're better off being in a boat. Some people say you're better off being on shore."
Whichever option paddlefishers choose, Schelhaas said it is important for everyone to follow the rules.
"Remember that the only people that can fish for and catch paddlefish are the actual tag holders, and once you catch and tag a paddlefish, you have to quit paddlefishing," he said. "One of the more common violations we find we call party fishing, where somebody will put a tag on a paddlefish that they did not catch, and that is illegal. Once you tag that fish, you're done paddlefishing, and you can only tag a fish that you caught."
Schelhaas added that safety out on the river is also extremely important.
"I want to remind people to be courteous to other fishermen and to be safe out on the water. Wear your lifejackets, and if you're going to stay out after dark, make sure your boat lights are working," he said. "The other thing we run into is boating under the influence. Make sure you're not drinking too much alcohol while you're operating a boat."

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SDSU Names Denny Everson 2011 Friend Of Beef Industry

BROOKINGS — South Dakota State University named Denny Everson as the 2011 SDSU Friend of the Beef Industry. This annual award is presented at SDSU's Beef Bowl Football Game on Saturday Oct. 1. Dr. David Chicoine, President of South Dakota State University, and Dr. Barry Dunn, the Dean of the SDSU College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences will present the award.
Everson was selected because of his life-long service to the South Dakota beef industry, and his support of South Dakota State University. Everson is the executive vice president and market manager administrator of First Dakota National Bank Yankton.
In 1984, Everson joined in a concerted effort to organize a rendezvous between West River Cattlemen and East River Cattle feeders in an attempt to mitigate the effects of the 1980s Ag Depression. In 1993 and 1995, he joined South Dakota Cattle Trade Missions to Mexico to promote South Dakota cattle genetics. In 1999, he spearheaded the establishment of the Beef Bucks Account at First Dakota National Bank. In 2004, he supported the development of the popular Beef Bucks Card. Since the establishment of the partnership with First Dakota National Bank and the Beef Council, the bank has purchased \$200,000 in Beef Bucks.
In 1999, when Everson was chairman of the South Dakota Livestock Expansion Foundation board, he helped establish South Dakota Ag & Rural Leadership (SDARL) organization. SDARL is dedicated to identifying and developing leaders in agriculture and rural communities. This

we're doing a terrible job of it," Rhoden said.
The Legislature must redraw the boundaries of legislative districts every decade to reflect population changes reported by the census. The ideal district would contain 23,262 people, but courts have said each district can vary by 5 percent above or below that number.
Republicans currently have a 30-5 edge over Democrats in the Senate and a 50-19 edge in the House, which also has one independent.
Much of Tuesday's discussion focused on public testimony regarding three districts in the state's northeastern corner and the nine districts in the Sioux Falls area.
Former legislator Bill Thompson of Sioux Falls, leader of a citizen's panel that drew its own suggested redistricting plan, said the GOP proposal once again creates a District 15 in central Sioux Falls that is packed with too many Democrats. That leaves too few Democrats in nearby districts, which gives Republicans an edge in those areas, he said.
Each district now elects one senator and two House members at large, except for two Senate districts that are split into two House districts, each of which elects its own House member.
Thompson and other Democrats argued that nearly all Senate districts should be split into two House districts, which they said would give Democrats a better chance of competing against Republicans.
Rausch said the committee would not consider splitting all Senate districts into two separate House districts because the Legislature has consistently rejected such a move.
The panel approved a change in the original Republican proposal for the three districts in northeastern South Dakota, but Democrats said it still throws five incumbent Democrats together in one district that only elects one senator and two representatives. Wismer said the district would include her, Sen. Jason Frerichs of Wilmet, Rep. David Sigdestad of Pierpont, Rep. Dennis Feickert of Aberdeen and Rep. Paul Dennert of Columbia, who is term-limited in the House and would have to run for the Senate to remain in the Legislature.
One district includes most of Aberdeen, the state's third-largest city. Part of northwestern Brown County would be placed with Marshall, Day and Roberts counties to form a new district, while the rest of Brown County outside Aberdeen would be joined with part of Spink County and all of Clark and Hamlin counties in another district.
Wismer said the Republican map would put one area more than 100 miles away from the opposite corner of that district.
Residents of north Rapid City had asked that the area, which has a high concentration of Native American residents, be put into a single legislative district, but the committee voted unanimously to approve a plan that keeps districts in the Rapid City area as close as possible to existing districts.
The committee also made a minor change in a district that would stretch from Tripp County to Bon Homme County in south-central South Dakota. The original plan would have put veteran lawmaker Frank Kloucek, D-Scotland, in that district, but the panel changed it so Kloucek will remain in a district more like the one he currently represents.
Joel Keierleber of Colome told the committee that legislators often seem to favor redistricting plans that protect their own chances for re-election.
Dorris Heaston, president of the South Dakota League of Women Voters, said she believes redistricting plans should be made by an independent panel, not by legislators. She said she is bothered when a legislator refers to "my district."
"Those districts do not belong to the any of the representatives or senators. They belong to the people, the voters," Heaston said.
But Rhoden said he believes it's proper for him to refer to the area he represents as his district because he is proud of the rural district. He said the South Dakota Constitution requires that redistricting be done by the Legislature.
