than the previous year," Warner said. "We think it may have something to do with an economy that is beginning to improve. In particular, part-time adult students are finding their way to the job market ... Whether that is in fact a trend related to the easing of the recession, I don't know. But that's one way to speculate about it."

"The other way to speculate about it is to say that we're comparing ourselves against a very high base last year," he continued. "So this maintaining a virtually level enrollment this year was expected because last year's rate of growth was probably not sustainable in this kind of climate."

Headcount enrollment at USD fell 1.78 percent to 9,970 students, dipping below the 10,000-student benchmark that was first reached in 2010 with an enrollment of 10,151 students.

However, the college's total full-time equivalent student enrollment increased from 7,069 students from the fall of 2010 to 7,233 in 2011. USD joins Northern State University and Dakota State University as the three regental schools to grow their full-time equivalent enrollment from last year to this year.

James Abbott, president of the University of South Dakota, stressed the increase in freshman enrollment during Tuesday's conference call.

"The big news at USD this fall is a 9 percent increase in first-time, full-time freshman," he said. "We're particularly pleased about that. This is not only our largest freshman class ever, but ACTs are higher, high school GPAs are higher and class rank is higher, as well."

"Obviously," he added in a media release, "we are very pleased with our growth of traditional undergraduate students, but we are even more excited that we have been able to maintain a quality incoming freshman class."

He also noted a 28 percent increase in

students enrolled in the university's Honors Program and that residence halls at the college are about 99 percent full.

Meanwhile, Northern State University had an 8.6 percent enrollment increase — the highest of any school. The school enrolled 284 more students this year compared with last year.

Dakota State University and South Dakota State University each had a less than 1 percent decrease in student enrollment. South Dakota Mines & Technology decreased by 1.8 percent.

Blacks Hills State University saw the biggest decrease at 6.5 percent. The school enrolled 307 fewer students this year compared with last year.

Black Hills State President Kay Schalenkamp said the decline was directly attributed to losing graduate students who were part of a research grant.

The universities have so far been able to withstand a 10 percent budget cut by the state Legislature, Abbott said.

"The cuts, of course, are unfortunate in many ways," he stated. "We've all done what we needed to do to be more efficient."

Warner noted that the universities face demographic challenges because the number of high school-age residents in South Dakota and the region is expected to continue to decline through 2018.

"We feel we are capturing our fair share of those high school graduates," he said. "We have also increased our out-of-state student percentage from 29 percent last year to 31 1/2 percent this year. We do that by keeping our out-of-state tuition affordable."

"There is also a public policy reason for attracting out-of-state students," Warner added. "If we look at projected South Dakota demographics, there really is only one age group increasing in South Dakota and that's the over-65 population. We need to bring in young people to South Dakota, educate them here and hope to retain a significant portion of them to participate in our workforce, or we're likely to have significant workforce shortages."

state on stretches of road that are regularly flooded. The affected area runs three-quarters of a mile.

"That's really good news," Commissioner Allen Sinclair said. However, two residents from the area were not as impressed.

"Fabric and rock is not going to fix the problem," Jody Kludt said. "I think everybody in here knows that. It's putting a Band-Aid on it. We need to put culverts underneath that road so that the water is not going to go over the road. I think that's a wonderful thing you're looking at doing, but I'm wondering if you checked on any other options in the last two weeks (since your last meeting)?"

Commissioner Mark Johnson said he does not believe culverts would help move water because the river level is equal on both sides of the road.

"You would have to raise the road, which means you're going to be backing up water somewhere else upstream," he added. "Basically, you'd be building a dam."

"What we're talking about is taking care of the road we have and keeping it from washing out every year," Johnson continued. "That's what this will do. Yes, it's going to have water over the road, but if we stop the water over here, it's going to back it up and put it somewhere else."

He likened it to the building up of Highway 81 downstream along the James River, which he blamed for worsening flooding over 431st Avenue.

William Kludt expressed dissatisfaction with not only the proposed solution but also the length of time it will take to accomplish it.

"I can tell my neighbors now that nothing is going to happen this fall, and probably nothing is going to happen next spring," he said.

Because the subject was not on the agenda for Tuesday's meeting, the commission did not vote to pursue the funding program. Instead, commissioners cast an unanimous vote declaring their intention to vote in favor of pursuing the funding at next Tuesday's meeting.

In other business Tuesday, the commission was given an update on the Deer Boulevard bike trail by Pete Johnson of Johnson Engineering. He is overseeing the project for the county.

He said that chip-sealing is expected to occur today (Wednesday) and that the work completed on the project has been acceptable.

The commission chose to table for a second time a request from the contractor to extend the deadline for finishing the project. Instead, a decision will be made once the trail is complete.

Also Tuesday, the commission:

- concluded its budgeting process in advance of finalizing the budget document in October. Among the decisions made were to

delay a decision to hire two more deputies for the sheriff's office until the end of the year and to set aside approximately \$50,000 to build a cold storage area for Emergency Management at its Eighth Street and Douglas Avenue site in Yankton. Commissioner Garry Moore suggested that the county consider using the Highway Shop along Broadway Avenue for that purpose once it is moved to its new location late this year or early next year.

- agreed to have three appraisals done of the aforementioned Highway Shop property;

- heard a request from Yankton Office of Economic Development Director Mike Dellinger to address drainage issues in county right-of-way near Baldwin Filters, which has plans to expand in the near future. He asked for a commitment of up to \$35,000, and the commission said it would consider the request at the end of the year when it is determined how much contingency money will be available;

- heard a request for funding to clean out old beaver dams in a waterway south of Volin; and

- heard a funding request from the Gayville Fire Department to assist in the purchase of equipment. As with the drainage request, the commission said a decision would come at the end of the year.

A public hearing will be held in the DSS Conference Room, Kneip Office Building, 700 Governors Drive, Pierre, South Dakota on October 18, 2011, at 9:00 a.m., to consider the adoption and amendment of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Program rules.

The effects of these rules will be to: repeal obsolete rules, update definitions, update services that may be provided by programs to victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse, remove duplicative statutory language, clarify that a program may not impose income standards or mandate participation in a service as conditions of eligibility, outline standards for hotel or motel facilities or private homes that are used as shelter, and outline policy and by
