

# Coyotes 'Excited' To Open Glenn Era At Montana

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VERMILLION — A team familiar with winning at home is headed to a place where the home team boasts a significantly higher rate of success.

In face of these odds, it begs the question: Can the University of South Dakota begin the Joe Glenn era with a victory today (Saturday) at Montana?

The Coyotes, with a new coach and FCS playoff eligible for the first time, open their season this afternoon at 10th-ranked Montana. Confidence is not lacking for the visitors, however.

"We couldn't be more excited," senior receiver Will Powell said. "They're one of the most well-known programs at our level. They don't lose much at home, so we know we have our backs against the wall. We wouldn't want it any other way, honestly, because we know we have every potential to win the game."

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Montana, a regular in the FCS post-season picture, is 74-8 at home in the last decade. The Grizzlies have lost just

one game at Washington-Grizzly Stadium since 2008.

Considering the odds stacked against the Coyotes, Glenn — like Powell — was confident in his team's mindset as he spoke Wednesday at Yankton's Quarterback Club.

"We're not going to Montana for a check," he said. "This is a big game for us."

Montana returns seven starters from a team

that went 11-3 last season, won the Big Sky Conference title and advanced to the FCS playoffs semifinals — losing to Sam Houston State.

Since then, however, the Grizzlies have been engulfed in scandal.

An investigation found that football players were involved in sexual assaults between September 2010 and December 2011, news that were prominent in the firings of the athletic director and football coach Robin Pflugard.

Naturally, the Grizzlies are looking to move on from that past under new coach Mick Delaney. Helping in that effort figures to be a loud crowd, according to Glenn — who estimated that the homefield advantage is worth 10 points.

"It's crazy. You have twenty-five thousand people sitting right on top of the two teams," Glenn said. "It makes so darn much when we have the ball that we have to use signals and hold hands at the line of scrimmage."

The key for the Coyotes, according to Powell, is responding to such adversity.

"Things will go wrong and the fans will be on you, but that's how good teams get it done; moving past all that stuff," said Powell, who had 42 catches for 763 yards and five touchdowns a year ago.

Both teams will have a handful of new faces on each side of the ball. Montana replaces four starters on the defensive line and in the secondary, while USD has four new faces on the offensive line — not to mention a new quarterback.

It'll be that new face, in sophomore Josh Vander Maten, that will go a long way toward determining today's outcome, Glenn said.

"They're the favorites, there's no doubt," he said. "We are close; really close. A lot of it will depend on Josh, we're going to put it on him a little bit."

"If he can pull off what we think he can, we're going to pull off some lightning in a bottle."

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## Fifth Annual Triple V Set For Sunday

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Early Sunday morning, Lewis and Clark Lake will come alive with hundreds of splashing arms and legs as the fifth annual Triple V Triathlon kicks off at 8 a.m.

Both individuals and teams will take part in the one-quarter mile swim, 14.3 mile bike ride, and 3.1 mile run.

The Triple V, which is an abbreviation of the Latin phrase "veni, vidi, vici," standing for "I came, I saw, I conquered," was the brainchild of triathlete and local resident Larry Leon. Leon, the Triple V race director, decided that the recreation area by the lake would be the perfect spot for a triathlon.

"I had been doing them (triathlons) for about 10 years and thought it would be nice to bring the sport to the community," Leon said. "This is a great triathlon because the venue is all here — from the lake to the dam to cross (on the bike portion) and biking to Nebraska and then back over the Discovery Bridge — and it is an unique flat, fast course."

Last year 200 individuals and teams competed in the action and this year's number of athletes should be at least that many.

One of the most unique aspects of the race, besides the course and state-border crossing it involves, is the name.

"We thought what a great name," Leon said. "This race is really about each individual person; each person is racing and challenging themselves. It is fun to see them at the finish line."

Even though Leon admitted that he has given a lot personally to make this race a success, he was quick to praise his sponsor and partners to make the Triple V Triathlon an annual event.

"Scott Family Dentistry, Orthopedic Institute, Sioux Falls Open MRI, and CorTrust Bank have really helped to make this event happen," Leon said.

Leon added that Lynn Peterson of CorTrust has been his biggest supporter and a large part of the motivation to put this race together.

## Gazelles Sweep Pierre

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Some teams might prefer to play more than once a week, but the 2012 version of the Yankton Gazelles volleyball team actually wants it that way.

With only two returning players with significant varsity experience, it makes sense that the Gazelles would want extra time after a season-opening loss last weekend.

Yankton put that defeat behind them by sweeping Pierre 25-12, 25-18, 25-22 in an Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) volleyball match Friday night at the Summit Center.

"We couldn't have planned that any better," YHS coach Lease Woodward said of the schedule, which gives the Gazelles a full week since the opener and a week until their next match.

"It's awesome for the group we have, with all the inexperience," she added. "That's how we'd like it; to have a test and then a week of homework."

Seniors Kelsey Fitzgerald (11) and Mikala Hora (10) combined for 21 kills in the victory, which saw the Gazelles come out strong in the opening set — at one point leading 20-8.

"We had a really good week of practice, and that definitely helped us," Fitzgerald said. "That's what we need to have, more time to work on stuff."

Gazelles had more of a challenge in the second set (including a timeout after a sluggish start), but controlled the net late to win.

"Yankton came out really physical and it doesn't help when we don't play much defense," Pierre coach Kacy Kienholz said. "We didn't attack when we put together a few points."

"Just way too many mental errors, which tells me we weren't ready to play."

One of the biggest weapons for Yankton aside from the senior-led hitting was serving. The Gazelles recorded nine ace serves, led by six from senior Maria binder.

"Pierre has some great hitters, but we did a good job keeping their offense back," Woodward said of the serving. "That's something we worked on a ton lately."

Yankton struggled early in the third set, but rallied to pull in front 21-20 and cruising from there, 25-22.

Binder led the offense with 25 set assists, while freshman Becky Frick had four kills. Defensively, junior Brooke Wuebben had nine digs, while junior Rylee Smith, Hora and Fitzgerald all had eight digs.

"We were scrappy, that's how I would call it," Fitzgerald said. "We got after every single ball out there."

Pierre hosts Brookings next Tuesday, while the Gazelles are off

**New-Look**

**Jayhawks Led By Weis Finally Take Field**

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — All the bluster is over for Charlie Weis.

He won the opening press conference, quickly endearing himself to a skeptical fan base at Kansas. He turned over most of the coaching staff and reworked a team that won two games a year ago, making all the right moves and saying all the right things every step of the way.

Now, it's time to see whether the new-look Jayhawks led by the former Notre Dame coach have made progress in the short time that Weis has been at the helm.

Kansas opens its season Saturday night against South Dakota State.

"I'm really excited for our team, to see how they are going to play, more than anything else," Weis said. "We have been talking about this stuff forever. Now it's time to play and get an opportunity to see where we are."

Just about anywhere would be better than where Kansas finished last season.

The Jayhawks started off with a pair of wins against McNeese State and Northern Illinois, a team that would eventually win 11 games. But Kansas followed that with 10 straight losses, allowing at least 60 points three times and getting shut out by Texas along the way.

Coach Turner Gill's fate may have been sealed midway through the season, but a 24-10 loss to rival Missouri in what could be the final meeting for years encapsulated the state of the program.

Kansas athletic director Sheanon Zenger promised he would make a bold hire, and the former football coach certainly did that. Weis was coming off a mediocre season as offensive coordinator at Florida, and his only stint as a head coach with the Fighting Irish ended in disappointment. He also boasts Super Bowl rings and is widely regarded as an offensive genius.

So while Weis was certainly off the radar, most people who make the Saturday pilgrimages to Mount Oread were content to sit back and let things play out.

Weis wasted little time changing every aspect of the program.

He booted a slew of players for various reasons, putting in place rules designed to impart on the team some semblance of accountability. He told new strength coach Scott Holospole to put those left behind through the most grueling offseason workout they had ever experienced.
