The commission voted unanimously to authorize the state's attorney to request a forfeiture of the bond for LRC on the bike trail project. Furthermore, they asked that LRC be notified by registered letter that it is not to proceed with any work on the trail after 3:30 p.m. Sept. 5.

Jensen said a new contractor will have to be found, and work will almost certainly not proceed until next year. The bond

money will be used to pay the new con-

struction firm. "We want the trail done right," he stated.

Also Wednesday, the commission: • held an executive session about a personnel matter. After emerging from behind closed doors, the commission voted unanimously to have the state's attorney draft a letter of reprimand notifying a female employee of the commission's concerns. Failure to respond to those concerns could result in a suspension or more severe actions, Commissioner Allen Sinclair said;

• briefly discussed a proposed plan to restructure the Highway Department to, in the words of Moore, "bring it into the 21st century." He and Sinclair worked with Planning and Development District III to do a survey of how other county highway shops are structured, and modeled the plan on their findings. Current employees could interview to be hired under the new job descriptions should the proposal be adopted.
