## OF THE OUTDOORS | GARY HOWEY **Fall Hunting Around The Corner**

Fall is a great time of the year and will be here before you know it. There are numerous reasons I love the fall season. Insects become less of a problem, temperatures begin to cool off, allowing the nights to cool down and the fish will really become active and the best thing of all it's the beginning of the fall hunting season.

This time of the year can be tough on an outdoor person like myself, as I don't know if I should pick up the shotgun or grab my rod. That's why I carry a wide variety of outdoor gear in my vehicle during the fall, doing my best to make sure that all of it gets the

same amount of attention.

With the extremely hot weather this year, water will be the key as birds and other wildlife will need to be located near the remaining water holes and streams. Our early

fall hunting seasons began the first of September with the opening of all of the other hunting seasons not too far away.

The first hunting seasons to open will include dove, grouse, early waterfowl, archery deer, archery antelope, fall turkey and squirrel.

Dove, Sharptail Grouse & Prairie Chicken seasons will open up in early September.

#### Dove

There should be good numbers of doves in the upper Midwest unless the weather changes

#### drastically. If that happens, our local birds may move south, but there's a good chance migrating birds coming in from the north will give hunters another shot at the birds before the season closes.

Dove season opened Sept. 1 in Nebraska, running through Oct. 30. The daily limit is 15 with a

possession limit of 30. Dove season in South Dakota opened Sept. 15 and runs through Nov. 9 with a daily limit of 15 and a possession limit of 30.

#### **Grouse/Prairie Chicken**

Reports of good population of these species should assure good hunting in both South Dakota and Nebraska.

Nebraska's west grouse/prairie season runs through Jan. 31, 2013. The daily limit is 3 with a possession of 12. The East zone, which opens at the same time as the west, which is east of Highway 81, requires a special permit, which is available from the Game & Parks. The daily limit east of Highway 81 is 3 with a possession limit of 3. In South Dakota the seasons

starts Sept. 15 and runs through Jan. 6, 2013. The daily bag limit in South Dakota is 3 birds with a possession limit of 15 birds.

#### Early Waterfowl

Waterfowl hunters will have several opportunities to hit the field and water during the early season.

The September early Canada goose season, which is open to both residents and non-residents, begins September 1st through Sept. 30 with a daily limit of 15 and a possession limit of 30.

The Nebraska waterfowl seasons, which are broken down into zones with the early Ne-

braska teal season in the Low Plains will open today (Sept. 8) through the 23rd, while the High Plains season will be open Sept. 8-16.

#### Archery Deer

Excellent deer numbers came through the mild winter last year, with the hunting season looking to be an excellent one. The extremely hot summer temps we had this year created problems,

and because of this and the EHD that's appeared in the area, some hunters may find less deer in their on their hunting grounds. The Game & Parks have reported an unusually large number of dead deer are being found throughout the upper Midwest.

The archery deer season in Nebraska opened Sept. 15 running through Dec. 31st. Archery deer permits are unlimited in Ne-

braska and can be purchased on-

The South Dakota season will open up Sept. 22nd and run through Jan. 15, 2013. Residents and nonresidents are eligible to apply for all deer seasons except Custer State Park and East River Deer. Nonresidents may apply for an East River Deer license if there are leftover permits available after the drawing.

#### Archery Antelope

Antelope numbers in western Nebraska and west river South Dakota should be similar to those seen last year.

The dry weather has dried up many of the water holes the antelope used; look for the majority of the antelope to be found in and around remaining water holes and stock tanks.

The archery antelope season in Nebraska opened Aug. 20 and runs through Dec. 31.

The South Dakota archery antelope season opened Aug. 18 and runs through Sept. 28 closing during the rifle season and the reopening Oct. 15-31.

In Nebraska, there's a muzzleloading antelope season, which is open Sept. 17-Oct. 2.

#### Fall Turkey

Turkey numbers in Nebraska and South Dakota are up this year as the mild winter and dry year have helped the turkey population to increase.

The fall shotgun season in South Dakota, which is open to both residents and non-residents, opens October 1st running through Jan. 31, 2013. This season covers most of the state with the exception of Custer State Park where there is no fall season. There is no fall archery season in South Dakota, however archery equipment may be used for the firearms season.

In Nebraska, where there is both a fall archery and shotgun season which runs Sept. 15-Dec. 31. Fall turkey hunters in Nebraska can take two birds on each permit.

#### Squirrel

Squirrel hunting used to be one of the more popular sports, but with trees and shelterbelts being removed the squirrel habitat has diminished, concentrating the squirrels in smaller areas. Squirrel populations are reported to be good in the areas with healthy wooded areas.

The Nebraska squirrel season runs Aug. 1-Jan. 31, 2013, with a daily bag limit of 7 and a possession limit of 28, while the South Dakota season opened Sept. 1, running through Feb. 28, 2013, where the daily limit is 5 per day and a possession limit of 15.
