The Yankton cheer and dance teams spent Saturday in competition at the Yankton Cheer and Dance Invitational, both placing second.



The overall dance champion was Sioux Falls Washington with 293.33 points. Yankton placed sec-

For kick, Yankton placed first with 246 points, followed by Brandon Valley (229) and Watertown (191.5). VERMILLION - Any such concerns about the running game following a 60-yard effort a week ago were put to rest in a big way by the University of South Dakota football team.

Totals of 238 yards and an average of 5.9 per carry made sure of that.

Senior Marcus Sims highlighted that performance with 127 yards and sophomore quarterback Josh Vander Maten ran for two scores in a game USD won 31-21 over Colgate University in Saturday's home opener at the DakotaĎome.

"There was a lot of room out there, you could go full speed, and that's a testament to our offensive line," said Sims, whose 5-yard touchdown run with 9:31 left put the Coyotes ahead by 10.

"I'm just glad we go the run game established last week we weren't able to," he added. "It's good to get things going.'

It took a while for that to happen, however.

The Coyotes tied the game on a Vander Maten 18-yard touchdown run, once again scoring on a designed keeper that took advantage of giant holes by the line. "I'm very proud of our offensive

Huskers Must Repair Defense To Contend In Big Ten South Dakota State defeated South-Will Compton said. "We didn't come to play night, handing the Lions their first

After UCLA embarrassed Nebraska on the national stage, the Cornhuskers can take comfort in knowing the Big Ten still looks winnable.

Of course, even that will be a long shot for Nebraska (1-1) if coach Bo Pelini and his staff can't figure out how to shore up a defense that allowed 653 yards in a 36-30 loss at the Rose Bowl stadium on Saturday night.

In the 124 seasons of Nebraska football, only the 1956 Oklahoma Sooners totaled more offense against the Huskers.

Nebraska (1-1), out of The Associated Press Top 25 for the first time in three years, starts over this Saturday at home against Arkansas State (1-1). The Huskers will play FCS-level Idaho State the following week in Lincoln before Wisconsin comes to town Sept. 29 for the

Big Ten opener.

Shortly after his team got rolled in Pasadena, Calif., Pelini emphasized the Huskers' main goal — returning to the Rose Bowl as Big Ten champion — remains intact.

"We want to play our last football game out here," he said. "To do that, we have a lot of work to do. We've got to get better, obviously.'

UCLA redshirt freshman quarterback Brett Hundley, making his second start and playing behind a young offensive line, skewered the Huskers for 358 total yards and four touchdowns

Johnathan Franklin rushed for another 217, the sixth-highest total ever by a back against Nebraska and most since Pelini took over in 2008. Franklin also caught three passes for 53 yards, including a 9-yarder for the Bruins' last touchdown.

"You've got to give them credit," linebacker

Steele Jantz threw for 241 yards and the game's only touchdown on Saturday and Iowa State beat Iowa 9-6 for its first win in Iowa City in 10 years. Jake Knott's interception with 1:11 left sealed the win

for the Cyclones (2-0), whose defense held lowa to just 304 yards of offense. Iowa State was held scoreless in the second half. But

the Hawkeyes (1-1) could only muster a pair of short field goals in the lowest-scoring matchup between these instate rivals in 24 years.
