In short, it's when a big school like Nebraska pays a small school like South Dakota State a large sum of money to come play (and conceivably lose big). It doesn't always work out that way, as North Dakota State fans will tell you and as SDSU proved in 2010, only losing 17-3.

Sometimes those paychecks can be large, in the neighborhood of \$1 million, but in most cases the pay-out is smaller - in USD's case with the Sept. 22 game at Northwestern, the Coyotes will receive \$325,000. Still, USD athletic director David Sayler said this week that Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) schools

- Using the example of Nebraska, the Huskers are paying lowly Idaho State loser of 33 straight road games \$700,000 to play in Lincoln on Sept. 22. That's a lot of money, sure, but could it be more? "I really feel like there needs to be a change in how FCS athletic directors look at these games," Sayler said this
- week. He said the difference in scholarships (85 for FBS and 63 for FCS) "doesn't justify being paid a lot less." He's got a point. Consider that the Sept. 22 game will still be broadcast on the Big Ten Network, and that Ne-

aska will still likely sell out Memorial Stadium, thereby making the same amount of money on gameday. Not only that, Sayler is of the opinion that FCS schools should wait before signing guarantee contracts too far

in advance. Why sign now when you can wait to earn more money down the line, when big schools get desperate

and Savler said he would prefer to keep it to one FBS game per year — as is the case this season.

The one caveat over the next two years, though, would be that schools can schedule 12 games starting next season, and Sayler said if another FBS game presented itself, he would consider it — only in a 12-game season.

Options for additional guarantee games against regional teams are still available, specifically with Big Ten schools.

'We've been working our tails off to get games in Iowa and Nebraska, but they haven't worked out yet," Sayler said. "It's a long process, when you consider finding the right dates and figuring out dollar amounts.

USD is also nearing an announcement on a home and home contract with an FCS school for 2013 and 2015, according to Sayler.

Glenn — in his first season as coach at his alma mater — has experience on both sides of the guarantee game coin from his time at Montana, an FCS school, and FBS Wyoming. While at Wyoming, his Cowboys played games against FCS schools Ap-


"Once in a while those things happen," Glenn said. "You see it happening in our league. I love it when our guys smack them in the mouth; going in there getting a paycheck and the victory.
