job was the opportunity to work in multiple areas of art.

“What’s interesting about Yankton Area Arts is that it covers more than just one category,” she said. “It has the summer music concerts, the summer arts festival that brings in all kinds of different art, and they’ve done some culinary art celebrations here. There’s just a lot of facets to it that spoke to me.”

Quinn added that she was also drawn to the position by its educational aspect. As both a parent and a former teacher, she said she is looking forward to supporting the need for art education in the community.

“Seeing that we are advocates for that and we can speak loudly and say that’s important for our children, it’s just a really good fit,” she said.

As YAA executive director, Quinn will serve as the front person for the organization’s gallery and events, as well as its voice for art advocacy in the community. She will also work with the YAA board to ensure its goals are accomplished.

“I’ve only been around her for a few days, but from what I’ve observed this week, I think she’s going to do a great job,” said YAA assistant director Craig Sherman. “She’s passion-

ate about what she does.”

Sherman added that Quinn has had little time to settle into her new position, as she has spent most of the week preparing for the YAA display and fundraiser being held this weekend, which features the Teget private art collection.

“She’s had to step in at a hard time, but things have really gone well,” Sherman said. “We’re glad to have her here.”

Along with continuing the work YAA does for the community, Quinn said she would also like to expand certain areas. She said she will examine ways to draw a younger membership, and she would also like to find opportunities for children to get more hands-on interaction with the association.

“There are so many good things that Yankton Area Arts does, it’s not necessary to change many of the things going on, but I would like to add some pieces to it,” she said.

With the support she has received so far from the YAA staff, Quinn said she feels confident with the work that lies ahead.

“Everyone is great to learn from,” she said. “I’m just really thankful to be back, and I look forward to hearing from people and responding in a way that reflects the community goals.”
