was able to close the gap 12-13. Woodward said the Gazelles' ability to dig themselves out of holes was one positive aspect of the entire match.


Unfortunately, we get ourselves into those holes, but this was progress from being in Watertown where we weren't able to play out of the hole until later in the set.

James Vandenberg added 228 yards passing for the Hawkeyes (2-1), who beat the Panthers, a Football Championship Subdivision program, for the 15th straight time despite losing backs Damon Bullock and Greg Garmon to injuries.

Weisman, a sophomore with 8 career yards rushing coming into the game, scored from 1, 1 and 2 yards out to help lowa avoid its third straight home loss dating to 2011.

But penalties and turnovers frustrated the Cyclones at times, though they still had enough to overpower their FCS opponent and start 3-0 for the second straight year and sixth time since 1981. Four

of the five previous 3-0 starts led to bowl appearances. "We really started fast and I thought our guys came out with great energy and urgency," Iowa State coach Paul Rhoads said. "I thought the focus was on the money and then we stalled as an offensive football team and we can't do that. We have to take advantage of the mo-

mentum that we started the game with and keep that pace going." Jantz completed 19 of 26 passes for 209 yards, with touchdown throws of 16 and 5 yards to Chris Young and 22 yards to Aaron Horne. He was intercepted once and lost a fumble.

Western Illinois (2-1) trailed 31-0 before Pat Smith kicked a 26-yard field goal in the first minute of the fourth quarter. Iowa State was playing its second-team defense by then.
