



Arrest Made In Area Battery Thefts

Tuesday in connection with dozens of thefts of batteries and other items, according to the Yankton County Sheriff's Office.

Matthew Thompson, 21, was arrested on charges of grand theft and intentional damage to property.

By Tuesday afternoon, Sheriff Jim Vlahakis said 30 separate incidents of theft were uncovered and more were expected. Gayville, Irene, Yankton and the Lewis and Clark Lake area were among the places where the alleged crimes had occurred.

'Most of them were thefts of batteries from campers and/or boats. There were also gas thefts (that included mounted fuel tanks)," Vlahakis said. "These were from storage facilities, businesses and private residences."

In Yankton alone, five cases of camper battery thefts have been reported since late August.

Vlahakis said authorities were able to track Thompson down after speaking with battery deal-


"I would encourage the owners of boats and campers to check them, and if they have something missing, contact the Yankton County Sheriff's Office," he stated. "Most of these thefts have not been reported yet."
