The services of YCPAT include home visits for children between birth and three that provide information to the parents about their child's development and include an activity for parent and child to engage in together. Group Meetings are held as a way for parents to connect with one another while participating in an activity with children and receiving valuable information about topics, including safety, nutrition, and toilet learning. Children receive annual health and development screenings which can help identify early signs of delays so that the child can receive additional assistance. In 2009 YCPAT also added Responsive Parenting Class which is a six-week class for parents with children ages birth to YCPAT has seen many exciting things

through our services. We have seen parents become reunited with their children who were in foster care. We offer free books to all of our families and have seen parents read to their children for the first time. We have explained to parents how simple everyday objects such as a clothes pin can be used to help prepare a child for writing.


