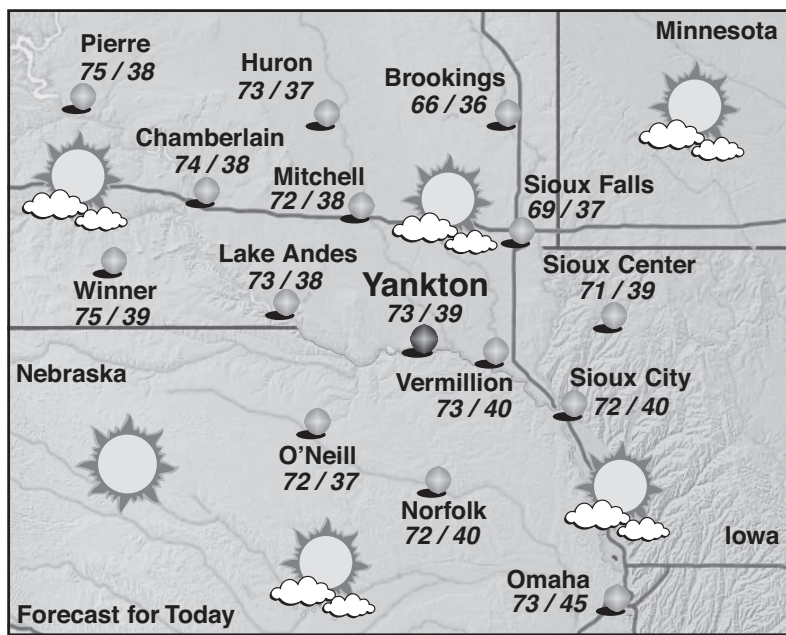

Yankton College Preps For Potential Emergencies

Yankton College staff and selected alumni participated in an orientation, on Sept. 5 at the Summit Activities Center in Yankton to review the official Yankton College Emergency Response & Recovery Plan.

Executive Director Jan Garrity endeavored to draft a plan with the help of an Emergency Preparedness Committee to minimize harm to the college historical collection and student records and to coordinate emergency procedures with those who share space within the common-use facility including: Yankton College, the City of Yankton's Summit Activities Center and Yankton High School.

The plan identifies potential emergencies and their responses, defines the chain of command and lists recovery procedures to resume normal college operations as quickly

as possible. The plan was officially approved last spring at the Yankton College Board of Trustees meeting and serves as a beneficial tool when it comes to applying for preservation grants.

Those assembled at the orientation are members of the chain of command, which breaks into four teams: the Safety & Security Team; the Administrative/Student Records Team; the Collection Team and the Building Team. The orientation included a review of the plan, distribution of emergency kits purposefully designed for each team and a drill of recovery procedures.

"The process of planning for the potential emergencies provided surprising benefits," Garrity said. "Those involved in developing the plan discovered the worthiness of Yankton College, now a historical repository, and

the value of minimizing risks that could affect its collection, records, staff and visitors. The Emergency Response & Recovery Team members plan to meet annually to review the plan and make necessary updates."

The chain of command includes Garrity as the Emergency Manager; Safety & Security Team Chair, Joan Neubauer '57 with member Cindy Filipis '65; Administrative/Student Records Team Chair, Lee Gass '80, with members Larry Hintgen x'61, Judi Olson and Joe Ward '66; Collection Team Chair, Suzan Gass '80 with members Craig Johnson '70 and Crystal Mensch-Nelson and the Building Team Chair, Al Koliner '74 with members Paul Rehlfuss '61 and Bob Winter '63.

DHHS To Hold Hearing On Medicaid Changes

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Division of Medicaid and Long-Term Care is holding a hearing on proposed changes to regulations that will prohibit Medicaid payment for health-care-acquired conditions and provider-preventable conditions as required by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. The hearing will be held at 1:30 p.m. CT on Thursday, September 27, in the Nebraska State Office Building in Lincoln, 301 Centennial Mall South, lower level conference room A.

The proposed regulations will:

- Define health-care-acquired conditions and provider-preventable conditions; and
- Set out which hospitals and providers are affected by the non-payment provisions.

Anyone may attend and comment at the hearing or submit comments in writing. Written comments will be given the same consideration as oral comments. Written comments must be postmarked or received by 5:00 p.m. CT on September 27 and should be sent to DHHS Legal Services, 301 Centennial Mall South, P.O. DENR Accepting Water Quality Projects Apps.

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of and Natural Resources (DENR) is accepting applications through Oct. 1, 2012, for projects eligible for federal Clean Water Act, Section 319 nonpoint source control grants.

DENR officials anticipate approximately \$2 million will be available for projects in South Dakota. The federal Environmental Protection Agency grants require 40 percent local match.

Eligible applicants include governmental agencies; state government subdivisions, such as conservation districts, water development districts, counties and municipalities; universities; certain nonprofit organizations; and federally recognized Indian tribes. Other groups may participate by applying through one of the eligible entities as a project partner.

Section 319 of the federal Clean Water Act provides grants to reduce water pollution from nonpoint sources, such as polluted runoff from urban, agricultural, and forest lands. DENR historically has used the Section 319 funds primarily to develop and implement projects designed to reduce nonpoint source pollution to meet Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs). South Dakota water bodies in need of TMDLs are listed in the 2012 Integrated Report for Surface Water Quality Assessment. A copy of the report is available from the DENR website at <http://denr.sd.gov/documents/12irfinal.pdf> and at libraries throughout the state.

Nonpoint source pollution originates from many sources, including heavily fertilized lawns, urban runoff that carries street and pet wastes, agricultural fields, small livestock operations, and natural sources, such as highly erosive soils. The primary nonpoint source pollutants in South Dakota are sediment, phosphorus, nitrogen, and fecal coliform bacteria.

presence since 1995 and announced its latest expansion in September of last year. The facility is located along Hastings Drive in the northeast part of the community.

The company has added 110,000 square feet to its existing 170,000-square-foot building, which created room for a new heavy-duty spin-on filter line. More equipment and capabilities will be added through 2014, meaning 60-70 jobs will be added incrementally possibly through 2015.

The plant employs more than 180 people, and plant manager Monte Gulick said 15 new hires have been made so far because of the expansion. The new \$5.75 million assembly line should be

running in about a month, he added.

The starting wage for assemblers is just more than \$11 an hour, and some support people for the new equipment will earn \$22-\$23 per hour.

When local and state officials first heard that Baldwin Filters was looking at a location to expand, they put together an incentive package for the company.

Baldwin Filters obtained a Revolving Economic Development Initiative (REDI) loan for the expansion, as well as a Workforce Development Grant through the Governor's Office of Economic Development. Yankton Area Progressive Growth offered up to \$40,000 for workforce training.

"Officials from the City of Yankton and Yankton County are very appreciative of Baldwin Filters' decision to further their investment here," Yankton Mayor Nancy Wenande said. "We reiterate our commitment as partners with Baldwin Filters and all

companies that want to invest and grow in Yankton. In the end, we believe Baldwin Filters recognized the fact that our community mindset complements the can-do attitude that is a part of their company's DNA."

Daugaard said companies like Baldwin Filters are a model for the nation.

"In the United States, manufacturing jobs over the last decade have generally trended downward," he said. "Contrary to that trend, in South Dakota, advanced manufacturing jobs that involve lots of automation and robotics are trending upward."

Low personal and business

taxes, reasonable regulation and a financially responsible state budget are the reason for that growth, Daugaard believes.

"Most important, we have workers in South Dakota who know the meaning of the word work," he added. "They are productive. In fact, they are among the most productive in America. When you hire someone here in Yankton, you're going to get someone who is ready to work, is hard-working and who cares about quality and productivity. That makes your company better."
