

campaign in the 2nd District, identifying and registering new voters and targeting young, minority and occasional voters. The campaign also worked on encouraging extensive early voting and spurring a large Election Day voter turnout.

Obama narrowly defeated Republican John McCain in the district — 138,809 to 135,439 — and took one of Nebraska's five electoral votes while McCain won the other four.

Nebraska Republicans don't like the fact that Obama found a way in 2008 to take advantage of the state's unusual system that allows for its electoral votes to be split. Maine is the only other state besides Nebraska that allows splitting electoral votes instead of the winner-take-all approach most states favor.

In addition to redrawing the lines of the 2nd District to make it more conservative, prominent

Nebraska Republicans, including Gov. Dave Heineman, have focused on the area to make sure GOP voters get to the polls.

Fahleson said he doesn't think enough of the voters that supported Obama four years ago will show up on election day.

"We're a conservative state," Fahleson said. "2008 was a mistake. It's not going to happen again in 2012."

Obama may not have campaigned in Omaha himself yet this year as he did in 2008, but during a visit to Council Bluffs, Iowa, last month he made sure to mention Omaha as he described his plans for the country.

A spokesman for the Obama campaign didn't respond to email messages Sunday.

Powers said the Obama campaign has motivated and talented people working in Omaha, so he's optimistic the city will again be known as the "blue dot city" in a red state. But he said the work the Obama campaign is doing in Omaha won't be apparent until after the election.

He said this lawsuit could provide guidance in future architecture copyright disputes.

"It's a case that could help guide architects in what can and can't be done with plans that have a copyright," Johnson said.

The copyright lawsuit is the second Charles Rose Architects has filed in relation to the Muenster University Center this

month. The firm filed suit in state court alleging the university failed to pay the firm for its work on the center, which was completed in 2009, and for work on the Beacom Center for Business.

That suit claims Charles Rose Architects is owed almost \$100,000 for the business school project and \$337,000 on the student union project.

Michael Luce, a Sioux Falls lawyer representing USD in the breach of contract dispute, said that case is in the early stages and he anticipates the courts will sort out the financial matters in a timely manner.

save the county money and make the voting system more efficient. During the last primary election, she said the cost per voter was as low as \$10 in one Yankton location and as high as \$170 at a rural polling station. The overall average cost was \$46.32.

With a voting center system, it is projected that the average cost could be reduced to \$2.79.

Because poll workers don't have to come from a specific precinct to work at a voting center, Jones said she will also have more flexibility in finding people to man the stations. Finding enough poll workers in each precinct has become a challenge in recent years, she stated.

Another change voters will notice is that physical poll books will be replaced by electronic poll books purchased from Hart InterCivic.

Jones hopes the demonstration Wednesday will help settle

any security concerns voters have with the new technology.

"One of the questions that came to mind when they approached me about it was, 'If I decide I want to go to Gayville to cast my ballot, what prevents me from going back to a voting center in Yankton because they will no longer have a printed list of who is in the precinct?' With these poll books, within five seconds of the voter signing their name on the electronic signature pad, every other voting center, as well as the auditor's office, will know they've cast a ballot."

A handful of other counties have already used the electronic poll books.

"I've talked with auditors in the other counties that have tried it, and they say it is a pretty seamless operation," Jones said.

Menno Band Day Slated For Friday

MENNO — Area bands will return to Menno on Friday, Sept. 28, for the sixth annual Menno Band Day.

Twenty-one middle school and high school bands will be participating in this street marching competition, with the Menno Wolves Marching Band and "The SOUND" of University of South Dakota Marching Band providing guest performances throughout the day.

Competition categories and entries are:

- Middle School Bands — Yankton, Sioux Falls Christian, Tea, Lennox, Elk Point Jefferson and Harrisburg.
- Class B — Arlington, Viborg-Hurley, Avon, Alcester-Hudson, Tripp-Delmont, Scotland, Gregory and Parker.
- Class A — Sioux Falls Christian, Tea, Lennox, Elk Point-Jefferson, Beresford, Tri-Valley and Plankinton/Mt. Vernon.

The parade starts at 10 a.m. with the Menno Wolves Marching Band leading the way. Middle School Bands will start off the competition. Class B will then take the street, followed by Class A. "The SOUND" will be the last performance of the parade. Bands will start their route at the corner of East Heil St. and South High St., proceeding west until South Fifth St. Bands will then march south on South Fifth St. until Juniper St. and turn right, marching past bands that marched prior to them and ending the route.

Upon the conclusion of the parade, all band members and community are invited to the Menno High School football field for a field performance by USD's "The SOUND."
