
Guthmiller Wins Title, Bucks Second At ESD Golf

On the eve of hosting the Eastern South Dakota Conference Boys' Golf Championships, the Yankton Bucks found out that one of their better golfers was going to miss the tournament

The Bucks, though, were not deterred and still finished within one stroke of the title.

Brandon Valley posted a team score of 309, one stroke better than the Bucks, to successfully defend its ESD title on Saturday at Fox Run Golf

The Bucks did take home one title on the day, as sophomore Jace Guthmiller shot a 2under 70 to run away with medalist honors.

Yankton's Lane Sawatzke, who also serves as kicker for the Bucks' football team, was hurt during Friday's football game at Brookings. The Bucks, though, still had a state-experienced golfer to fill in, junior Ben Jensen.

"I have to give our kids a lot of credit. I was hoping they wouldn't be discouraged, but we have got a lot of kids that can play," said Yankton head coach Brett Sime. "They didn't let the injury to Lane get to them.'

Brandon Valley won the title by putting its top four golfers in the top-eight of the individual rankings, led by Tyler Anderson's runner-up fin-

"We have depth, and that helped us against Yankton," said Brandon Valley head coach Scott Carroll. "Our number three golfer didn't play great, but our number five did."

The Lynx's Riley Duncanson tied for third at 77, and Greg Koehn and Trevor Tobin tied for fifth at 78 to finish the Brandon Valley team

Guthmiller shot par on the front nine, then shot 2-under on the back nine to earn his first major high school title. The sophomore said the run started as soon as he hit the back nine.

"On No. 10 an eagle helped me out," he said. "I putted well. I missed two putts, but I had some other birdies on the back."

The 2011 South Dakota Golf Association Junior Golfer of the Year has averaged an even-par 72 on the season, but did not win his first invitational until Saturday.

"Jace has really played well all year," Sime said. "I've really been impressed with the way he's been able to play. He picked a great time to break out and earn his first win, at the conference championships.

Yankton's 70 from Guthmiller helped put them in contention. Mitch Schlingman was in the group at 78, Brandon Frick shot 80, and Jensen

Yankton's Levi Gomez would take the next goal with the assist of Ludwin Arana, giving MMC the lead, but the Spires made the last two. Adam Newbanks was as

sisted by Christian Smith with 19 minutes left in the game, followed by Jake McCurry (assisted by Patrick Barden) nine minutes

Head coach Nathan Epp said the game was frustrating because the Lancers played a better game up until the end.

Oakland Tops USD 3-1 In Summit League Play

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VERMILLION — Two rather efficient sets. Two mistake-filled sets.

The result was a frustrating loss Sunday afternoon, as Oakland beat South Dakota 25-23, 23-25, 25-12, 25-21 in Summit League volleyball action at the DakotaDome.

More than anything else, the stat that stood out most was 30 attack errors by the Coyotes (8-8, 1-3) – playing their second game at their new upper-

"This is going to take some evaluation of film," coach Matt Houk said. "I didn't even think we executed early when we looked good - we weren't hitting the ball out of bounds at least.

'I'm just not really sure what happened to us." Both squads had an attack percentage over .300 in the first set, won by the visiting Golden Grizzlies. Neither side cracked .100 in the second set, though the Covotes did just enough to win 25-23

From there, the wheels fell off for the hosts. The combination of unforced errors — mostly in the form of spikes going wide, long or into the net — doomed the Coyotes in set three. USD's attack percentage was negative (-.032) thanks to nine errors, while Oakland torched the floor for 14 kills and one error.

An early spark for USD in set four quickly evaporated as Oakland reeled off seven straight points and won 25-21.

"I feel like we're right there, but just can't get over that hump," USD junior setter Tori Kroll said. "Until then, we just have to keep working on communication.

Glenn Disappointed In USD's 38-7 Loss To Northwestern

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — South Dakota coach Joe Glenn couldn't hold back. So he fired away.

Glenn spared no one after the Coyotes' 38-7 loss to Northwestern on Saturday afternoon, using words such as "pathetic" to describe a performance that he insisted sickened him.

"I understand getting beat by Northwestern, but I don't under-

stand beating ourselves," he said. South Dakota couldn't stop Venric Mark, who ran for 117 yards and three touchdowns, but the problems went beyond that. Center Tim Ross botched several snaps on a day when the offense never got going and the defense was over-

It all added up to this: A game that appeared to be a breather for Northwestern coming in, turning

out to be just that. The Wildcats (4-0) barely broke a sweat against a FCS opponent after tight victories over Syracuse, Vanderbilt and Boston College, building a 28-0 halftime lead with Mark going off for 97 yards and doing all his scoring.

The only real scare in this one came when Kain Colter took a hard hit from South Dakota's Chris Frierson at the end of a 10-yard run rather than slide. He landed on his left wrist, which has been bothering him since the opener against Syracuse, and spent most of the first quarter on the sideline. But Colter came back and finished with

46 yards passing and 38 rushing. Running back Mike Trumpy, meanwhile, sat out the first half and ran for just 10 yards, after going for 106 and a touchdown the previous week against Boston College in a game that coach Pat Fitzgerald said left him "a little banged up."

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The second-ranked Aberdeen Cenral Golden Eagles took a victory in Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) volleyball action on Saturday afternoon


against the Yankton Gazelles. The Eagles won in three sets by the scores of 25-
