For the second consecutive year the Yankton Bucks will put their perfect 5-0 record on the line against the Roosevelt Rough Riders. Last September the end re-sult was not what the Bucks hoped for, as Roosevelt used superior speed and size on their way to a 41-0 thumping at Crane-Youngworth Field.

This year, it will be the Bucks traveling to the newly renovated Howard Wood Field in Sioux Falls to challenge the 4-1 Rough Riders.

The two teams are currently tied for fourth in the Class 11AA South Dakota Sportswriters Association football poll for the second week in a row.

While Yankton has beat up on Eastern South Dakota Conference opponents for

all five of their wins, the Rough Riders have topped O'Gorman and Rapid City Stevens along with ESD teams Aberdeen Central and Watertown for their four victories. Their lone loss was an overtime defeat at the hands cross-town rival Lincoln, 36-35, back on September 8.

The Bucks realize the challenge that awaits them, as their last victory over a Sioux Falls school was a 10-7 playoff victory against Roosevelt back in 2007.

We've got to come up another level," Bucks coach Arlin Likness said. "The biggest thing will be for our defense to try and rise up to the occasion."

The Bucks have had no troubles stopping opponents thus far, allowing their competition to score only 8.4 points per game. But they now face a Roosevelt team that is averaging 36.4 points per game.

The Rough Riders return Sophomore

Taryn Christion at quarterback this week after he missed last Friday's game with an injury, a 45-0 victory over Rapid City Stevens. Christion has passed for over 800 yards and six touchdowns in the four games that he has played in this season in Roosevelt coach Kim Nelson's spread offense.

The Rough Rider defense has also been outstanding, allowing only 7.3 points per game in their four wins, exluding the 36-35 loss to Lincoln.

"We feel like we still have a lot of im-proving to do," Nelson said. "I believe we have some special talent at certain positions and just need to keep working hard and getting better."

While Roosevelt is looking to improve, Yankton is looking to get healthy.

Kicker Lane Sawatzke suffered a cracked femur on the opening kickoff of

the game against Brookings last weekend and will be out until at least the playoffs according to Likness. The Bucks do have the luxury of filling in sophomore and reigning NFL Punt, Pass and Kick national champion Brady Hale at the kicker position until Sawatzke can return. Hale missed all three of his field goal

attempts last Friday, but Likness still has confidence in his young kicker. "I feel real good with Brady," Likness

said. "I think he will refocus; he's a very good kicker."

Yankton will see senior C.J. Warren return from injury tonight and Likness is hopeful that Evan Schroeder and Tanner Termansen will also be back in the starting lineup after missing time with injuries. A big key to Yankton's success thus far

### **Campbell Trophy Semifinalist** DALLAS — South Dakota State

wide receiver Tyrel Kool was named on Thursday as one of 147 candidates for the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Awards, as well as a semifinalist for the 2012 William V. Campbell Trophy.

Kool, a senior from Yankton, has team-bests of 11 catches for 110 yards on the season, including eight catches for 76 yards against Kansas on Sept. 1. For his career, he has 102 receptions for 1,139 yards and four touchdowns, as well as 632 rushing yards with four touchdowns.

The NFF Awards Committee will select up to 16 recipients, and the results will be announced via a national press release on Thursday, October 25. Each recipient will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship, and they will vie as finalists for the 2012 William V.

Campbell Trophy. Each member of the 2012 National Scholar-Athlete Class will also travel to New York City to be honored December 4 during the 55th NFF Annual Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria where their accomplishments will be highlighted in front of one of the most powerful audiences in all of sports. One member of the class will also be announced live at the event as the winner of the Campbell Trophy.

Named in honor of Bill Campbell, the chairman of Intuit, former player and head coach at Columbia University and the 2004 recipient of the NFF's Gold Medal, the award comes with a 25-pound bronze trophy and increases the amount of the recipient's grant by \$7,000 for a total post-graduate scholarship of \$25,000.

## **Rubio On Track But** Won't Rush Return

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - Ricky Rubio says he hopes to return to the Minnesota Timberwolves sometime in December but insists he's "not going to rush it" to be sure he's ready.

Rubio's rehabilitation from reconstructive left knee surgery is on schedule. He spoke to reporters Thursday about his progress.

Rubio was hurt at the end of Minnesota's game against the Los Angeles Lakers last March 9, when he tried to plant his leg while defending Kobe Bryant. With one awkward bend of the point guard's most important joint, Rubio's impressive rookie season was over.

And so was that realistic chance the Timberwolves had of making the playoffs for the first time since 2004. They went 5-20 after Rubio was hurt.
