



LAKE ANDES — Two men face charges for possession of stolen property following Thursday's cross-country, high-speed chase through Douglas and Charles Mix counties.

The chase exceeded 100 miles per hour (mph) and lasted for about 1 hour, 15 minutes, according to The Associated Press.

The two occupants of the vehicle, Jacob Abdo and Michael Clark, were arrested following the chase, according to Charles Mix County Sheriff Randy Thaler.

The Thursday incident began when Douglas County authorities clocked the vehicle at approximately 10:30 a.m. traveling at excessive speeds, Thaler said in a press release.

Chief Deputy Gene Niehus and Deputy Jason Babl of the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, manning a radar gun, clocked a vehicle on Betts Road near Delmont traveling approximately 90 mph in a 55 mph speed zone. The deputies attempted to stop the vehicle, but it failed to pull over and a pursuit

ensued.

U.S. Highway 18 and entered Charles Mix County, at which point the Charles Mix County Sheriff's Office took over the pursuit.

At this time, it was revealed the vehicle was stolen out of Mitchell the previous evening.

The vehicle was eventually spiked at Stastny Corner, and the left front tire was deflated. The vehicle failed to stop and continued west towards Ravinia. It turned into Ravinia, then left town and proceeded south on the county oil road. The vehicle then turned west on a dirt road, at which time the vehicle ran out of gas.

The Charles Mix County Sheriff's Office arrested Abdo and Clark for possession of stolen property.

The press release said the following stolen property was found in the vehicle: cash, a 9mm pistol, a computer, an audio-visual projector and jewelry stolen from two Howard residences burglarized Thursday morning.

## **Electronic Lien And Title Implemented**

PIERRE — The Department of Revenue, Division of Motor Vehicles is implementing an Electronic Lien and Title system (ELT) on Oct. 1.

Under the ELT system, motor vehicle lien recordings and title applications processed on and after Oct. 1 that denote a lien will not be issued a paper title document. The title document will be retained electronically in the state's data base. A paper motor vehicle title certificate will be printed when the lien is released.

"The Division continues to look for effective, efficient ways to serve the citizens of South Dakota," said Division of Motor Vehicles Director Deb Hillmer. "Implementing the ELT system will provide advantages to our industry partners as well as individuals in the notation and release of liens, such as a reduction in duplicate titles and quicker receipt of title upon lien payoff."

South Dakota will join a number of other states that have already implemented ELT.

According to Hillmer, lenders recording a motor vehicle lien have the option to utilize an approved third party provider that will provide the lender with electronic notices of title and lien when the motor vehicle record is processed in the state system. Participating lenders will also release a lien electronically through its provider. Upon receipt of the electronic lien release, the title will be printed and mailed to the motor vehicle owner, unless directed otherwise by the lender.

Lenders that do not participate through a third party provider can obtain access to search the state's title system to verify title and lien records. Lienholder information, title brands, and other public motor vehicle information can be accessed through the SDcars system at www.sdcars.org by entering a valid motor vehicle VIN in the "VIN  $\sqrt{}$ " option.
