Literacy Council Certifies ESL Tutors

Eleven people gathered at the Yankton Public Library last week for classes in tutoring English as a Second Language. Funding for the program came from the Yankton Area Foundation of the South Dakota Community Foundation.

Representatives of the South Dakota Literacy Council, Sally Hillner from Brookings and Betty VanderZee from Volga, were here on Monday and Tuesday to present the program for tutor certification, the first in three years. Loretta Sorensen, President of the Yankton Area Literacy Council, and Bev Calvert, Coordinator for the Council, also helped lead the sessions.

The three classes, held all day Monday and on Tuesday morning, plus two hours of homework, were required for certification. Mary A. Pietila, Odie Tollefson, Cindy Bergman, Patty Stuelpnagel and Veronica Trezona completed the program and received certificates. Beth L'Amour and Uriel

Buitrago-Suarez were not able to attend all classes, but received paperwork for the parts completed.

Topics included were the myriad of textbooks available for the students, the assessment procedure for placing adults and customs of people from other parts of the world. Two current ESL students, Adriana de Anda and Brenda Angel, spoke as to how the program has worked for them.

The history of the literacv movement was also presented. Started in the Philippines by a missionary who went to work with a group of head hunters. Not wanting to lose his head, he asked the chief what he could do for them. The chief wanted to preserve their native language by developing a written portion of it. The missionary complied

and the program lasted until the depression when missionaries were called back due to the lack of money to fund them. The chief then called a tribal council


