The trustees' current policy however doesn't allow for benefit improvements until investments' market value reaches 120 percent of liabilities. That ratio was 104 percent as of June 30.

Using much of the 2013 investment gain to pay off the unfunded long-term liabilities means the system is in actuarial balance again at 100 percent. The actuarial ratio otherwise would have been 93 percent.

"It's hard to explain why a well-funded system has a deficit," consulting actuary Paul Scrader said. He said it would be

"tragic" if state policy-makers now thought the system didn't need to continue receiving the current level of contributions split between members and employers. The standard rate is 6

percent of payroll from each. SDRS had total membership of 77,588, with 23,441 members and beneficiaries receiving benefits as of July 1.
