Both the Yankton Bucks and Rapid City Stevens Raiders did not see what they were hoping for in last week's season opening games. The teams are hoping for better showings - and outcomes when they take to O'Harra Stadium tonight (Friday).

The Bucks make their first — and longest — road trip of the season today, facing the Raiders in the opening game of Rapid City's "Rushmore Bowl." The game will begin at 5 p.m. Mountain (6 p.m. Central), with Pierre and Rapid City Central playing the night-

Yankton comes in off a 27-21 loss to Mitchell, the Kernels' first win over Yankton since the 1987 regular sea-

son.
"We made more mistakes than we could get away with," said Yankton head coach Arlin Likness, "We committed turnovers, and not finishing plays hurt us on both offense and defense."

Stevens had a solid start, but ran out of gas down the stretch in a 34-9 loss to Sioux Falls O'Gorman.

"Right now we're struggling with depth," said Stevens head coach Scott Hagen, who made his Raiders' coaching debut last week after a successful run at Class 11A Sisseton. "O'Gorman had one offensive line, one defensive line, and we were playing a lot of those

guys both ways."
In the loss, Raider running back Carter Wevik touched the ball just three times, something that was forced by the O'Gorman defense.

"The game dictated passing, based on the defense they ran," Hagen said. "We weren't as sharp as we should have been in the passing game. We had six to eight dropped passes, and four of those would have been 20yards plus."

The Raiders rely offensively on junior quarterback Austin Hagen (239 yards, 1 TD), backed up by sophomore Brandon Soucy.

"Everything goes through our quarterback," Coach Hagen said. "He is expected to make reads at the line. For the most part, our quarterbacks did a good job of that."

Junior Jeremy Schick was the Raiders' leading receiver

USD Evaluating Volleyball: Huron Sweeps Gazelles 3-0 Its Options

VERMILLION — Two days after longtime men's basketball coach Dave Boots announced his sudden retirement, USD is still evaluating options on how to proceed.

Asked Thursday about the next step, athletic director David Herbster said there are no new developments and the administration continues to consider all options.

"For our players, the best thing they can do is conduct business as usual," Herbster said. "That's what our entire staff

That said, USD isn't interested in seeing the process drag on, he added.

'If it goes on too long without an announcement, people will start to wonder," Herbster said. "We don't want it to linger."

The administration does not want to set a time table for such a decision, Herbster said, adding that it's still early in the process.

In the 48 hours since Boots' resignation, USD has, however, sought advice from a number of sources — current coaches, athletic directors, search firms, other contacts — on how to proceed, Herbster said.

His staff has also received plenty of calls from interested coaches, as well as suggestions from other current head coaches.

"So close to the season, people naturally are curious," Herbster said.

Count former Coyote player Jeremy Kudera of Yankton among those curious. Kudera, who graduated in 2001 after a standout career with Boots, said that while "Covote fans will certainly miss not having Dave there," he believes long-time assistant Joey James would do well in any kind of interim phase.

"I know Joey pretty well, and he wants this badly," Kudera said Thursday. "It's a big decision they have to make, because they've got a very good tradition over

"Joey's been with Dave for 11 years, so he can relate to the players he helped recruit," Kudera said. "On the other hand, he doesn't have any head coaching experience, but everyone has to start at some

Kudera, like the rest of the Coyote supporters, awaits a decision by USD — "It'll be an interesting process."
