Destructive Insect Found In Yankton Co.

BROOKINGS — The first specimen of spotted-wing drosophila (Drosophila suzukii) was identified in South Dakota on Aug. 28. The specimen was collected in a vinegar trap set in Yankton County. Trapping and preliminary identification was conducted by Buyung Hadi, SDSU Extension Eurban Entomology Specialist. The identification was confirmed by Paul Johnson, Professor of entomology and director of Severin-McDaniel insect collection at SDSU

Spotted-wing drosophila was first detected in California in 2008. Subsequently populations of spotted-wing drosophila have been detected in multiple states in all parts of the country including the Midwest.

Unlike other vinegar flies that are considered nuisance due to their habit of laying eggs inside cracked or damaged fruits, female spotted-wing drosophila has serrated ovipositor capable of laying eggs inside healthy ripe fruits," Hadi said. "Consequently, developing larvae (small white maggots) can often be found within the harvestable fruits.'

Hadi said this is especially true for raspberry, blueberry and blackberry. Due to this, spotted-wing drosophila is considered a potentially damaging pest for small fruit produc-

SDSU Extension is currently organizing a volunteer-based trapping effort in collaboration with fruit growers across the state to assess the spatial distribution of the potentially damaging insect pest.



The online bidding process for Yankton's former downtown post office is set to close next week.

Online bidding for the property opened July 11 through the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) site RealEstateSales.gov. The auction site states bidding will close at 2 p.m. Tues-

The starting bid is listed at \$75,000, and a registration deposit of \$25,000 is required. The bid increment is \$5,000. So far, no one has bid on the property. William Morgan, a project manager with the GSA, has told the Press & Dakotan that it is typical for bidding not to start until the closing date has been

"There is a \$25,000 bid deposit required, and people don't like to hold up their money without knowing how long the auction is going," he stated.


The auction page notes that the bidding window could be extended. Bidder participation will dictate a

final closing time," Morgan said. The Yankton post office is among many U.S. Postal Service facilities the GSA is working to sell.

The downtown Yankton post office was closed in January 2012 and put up for sale. Postal operations were consolidated into the annex at 506 West 25th Street. That facility was built in 2000.

"Providing a special flag to each of our schools and administrative offices allows added opportunity to not only honor but never forget those who lost their lives for our country," Kindle said. "As a school district, we also want to express our deepest gratitude to all who serve

our country. Oswald thought the event helped convey the date's significance to other students.

I thought it was a really cool thing for our school to be able to do — to recognize all the people who work really hard in Yankton," she said. "I think (students) need to understand 9/11 and how awful it was and to be respectful about it.

Dvoracek added that this was also an opportunity to recognize the contributions Yankton's first-responders make to the community.

'We remember the people on 9/11, but we also want to acknowledge those who risk their lives every day," he said. "We wanted to get everybody involved just to

say thank you and we support you. Dvoracek said this is one

step to helping YMS students — who would be too young to remember 9/11 — understand the significance of this anniversary.

"Most of these kids were 2 or 3 years old or not quite born yet when this happened," he said. "We want to keep relaying the message and say that things may hit us but we're not going to go down. We're going to come back stronger and learn from some of the things we've done in the past.

to some extent, but we're going to reach limits real fast on that.

To cover the rest of the deficit, YSD will utilize \$944,569 (or roughly 20 percent) of the general fund reserves, leaving the fund balance at \$3,895,246.

During discussion on the capital outlay expenditures, it was noted that this year marks the final payment on the Summit Activities Center. The \$60,370 payment will be made in December.

While this year's \$15.4 million general budget is a sizable increase over last year : million figure, Bietz said that comparing the two amounts is deceiving because of the effort to spend down insurance fund reserves last year by only expending the equivalent of six months of premiums.

"Now we head into this budget with 12 months being budgeted to spend so that we are purposely spending down our general fund reserve," he said. "But we still have the health insurance fund out there that we have to contend with.'

Also at Monday's meeting, the school board:

• approved the renewal of a Consulting Service Agreement

with Silverstone Group, which has been advising the district on matters pertaining to the selffunded group health plan since 2007. The fees for services under the three-year tiered agreement will start at approximately \$26,000 and be raised to \$27,500 by the final year;

· approved a stop-loss reinsurance renewal premium of \$88.94 per employee per month, an administrative service fee renewal of \$42.96 per employee per month, and a modification to the prescriptions benefit that would allow members to receive a 90-day supply of maintenance drugs for one co-payment; authorized the tax levy

request for the 2013-14 school term (2013 taxes payable in

 approved a request from Gayville-Volin School District to establish student pickup points in YSD;

• heard a report from YSD Superintendent Wayne Kindle about a survey that will be used to gather information from the public about the school district. The survey is expected to be released within the next week.
