A Sunday tractor pull is usually a big draw, said Stern. A parade of the equipment-as well as other entries from the area-is held each day at 1 p.m. throughout the grounds.

This year the Historical Society is having an 11 a.m. parade down Main Street on Saturday. It starts with a Kid's parade with decorated bikes and such, said parade coordinator Elle Rice, and continues on with the Tripp-Delmont School band and an array of politicians, convertibles and floats.

"We are pretty excited to have this event, as it is only the third time in 17 years that there has been a downtown parade during the Kuchen Festival," said Rice. More entries are welcome, she added, with lineup beginning at 10:15 a.m. at Zion Lutheran Church on West Main Street.

More kuchen than ever before will be sold at the Legion Hall, where there also is a craft show and a bratwurst lunch.
