

been given — your time, your resources, your energy — and put Him first, then there's nothing wrong with being a head coach. There's nothing wrong with athletics. There's nothing wrong with trying to win," Osborne said. "But they've all got to be kept in the right place, and He's got to be first. And if you make Him first, and that's the way you order things, then things will begin to fall into place."

By putting Jesus first in their lives, people build a foundation based on stability, he said. This is especially important in areas such as athletics that have a volatile nature.

"Jesus always was, is and always will be, and that will not change," he said. "And when you're tied into that, you're tied into something that's permanent."

It also gives a person courage to stand alone when necessary, Osborne said. "Sometimes doing the right thing is lonely," he said.

Most of all, putting Jesus first gives one's life purpose and meaning — things people often

trade to "have a good time now," Osborne said.

"I've seen a lot of people that have gone down those roads and have made those decisions, but at some point, you come to a dead end," he said. "At some point you run into an alley and there is no way out."

Osborne said he witnessed that several times when former players left the National Football League and returned broken men. They had lived lives filled with money, celebrity, talent and youth, but had nowhere to turn when it was gone.

"I also noticed that with some guys, whatever happened to them, they landed on their feet," he said. "They had a life afterwards, and there was a purpose, some significance to what they were doing. Invariably, these people had a strong spiritual connection."

Osborne told his audience members that they could also have such a purpose in their lives if they made a decision to put Jesus first — just as he did all those years ago.

"I never turned back from that commitment," he said. "And that has made all the difference in my life."

Johnke said Jackson's mother has been informed of the decision not to press any charges.

"His mother understands the circumstances and didn't express any concern with the decision not to prosecute," he stated.


Added Klimisch, "If there was litigation of some sort done by the family, we would cooperate with them and provide them with everything we've obtained."

Jackson had recently moved back to Yankton after spending some time in Minnesota. He was to have started a new job with a local construction firm days after his death.

Kratz To Appear At Yankton Library

The Yankton Community Library will host an author talk and book signing at the library on Sunday, Sept. 15, from 2-4 p.m., when Marilyn Kratz debuts her most recent book "Feed Sack Dresses and Wild Plum Jam: Remembering Farm Life in the 1950s," which was published in conjunction with Prairie Hearth Publishing, LLC, Yankton. She will give a short talk and present readings from the book at 2:30 p.m. Copies of the book will be available at the signing.

The book contains a collection of humorous, informative, and sometimes sentimental articles about Kratz's life growing up on the family farm near Scotland. About a third of the articles were written specifically for the book. The others have appeared in the *Yankton County Observer* weekly newspaper where Kratz writes regularly for their "Good Old Days" feature.

In addition to the articles, Kratz included several poems she wrote and photographs relating to farm life. She also added old recipes which she found in her mother's handwritten cookbooks. One tells the reader how to make lye soap.

As a member of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators, Kratz has presented workshop sessions at conferences across the state as well as locally. Her next appearance will be as presenter of a session on poetry for the upcoming Northern Plains Professional Writers Conference to be held in Yankton on Oct. 18 of this year.
