By putting Jesus first in their lives, people build a foundation based on stability, he said. This is especially important in areas such as athletics that have a volatile nature.

"Jesus always was, is and always will be, and that will not change," he said. "And when you're tied into that, you're tied into something that's permanent."

It also gives a person courage to stand alone when necessary. Osborne said.

"Sometimes doing the right thing is lonely," he said. Most of all, putting Jesus

first gives one's life purpose and meaning — things people often

trade to "have a good time now," Osborne said.

"I've seen a lot of people that have gone down those roads and have made those decisions. but at some point, you come to a dead end," he said. "At some point you run into an alley and there is no way out.'

Osborne said he witnessed that several times when former players left the National Football League and returned broken men. They had lived lives filled with money, celebrity, talent and youth, but had nowhere to turn when it was gone.

"I also noticed that with

some guys, whatever happened to them, they landed on their feet," he said. "They had a life afterwards, and there was a purpose, some significance to what they were doing. Invariably, these people had a strong spiritual connection."

Osborne told his audience members that they could also have such a purpose in their lives if they made a decision to put Jesus first — just as he did all those years ago.

"I never turned back from that commitment," he said. "And that has made all the difference in my life.'

Eleven corrections officers from the state penal system have new jobs at the minimum-security federal prison at Yankton, and Lyle Swenson, member of the Board of Charities and Corrections, says it might mean security problems for the state system.

"The person initially believed they struck an animal in the road," Klimisch stated. "All his actions are not the actions of someone who believed they had hit a person. He went into town during the early hours like he does all the time. He even goes back home in that direction."

We just don't have the evidence to show that he knew at the time that he hit a person.

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
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
