BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for December delivery rose 5 cents to \$6.53 a bushel; December corn fell 6.25 cents to \$4.6625 a bushel; December oats were 4 cents lower at \$3.1825 a bushel; while November soybeans advanced 37.75 cents to \$13.96 a bushel. Beef was mixed and pork prices were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. October live cattle fell .23 cent to \$1.2482 a pound; October feeder cattle was .38 cent higher at \$1.5860 a pound; while October lean hogs were .10 cent lower at \$9.9020 a pound.

Watershed Task Force To Meet Monday

PIERRE — The Regional Watershed Advisory Task Force, created by the 2012 Legislature, will hold its third meeting of the 2013 Interim on Monday, Sept. 16, at The Galley Steakhouse, Lounge and Motel in Webster. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. (CT). The task force was created to study drainage, watershed management, flood control, erosion, and related issues, as well as studies of alternative organizational structures and entities to address such issues. The task force will operate until January 2015. At the Sept. 16 meeting, the task force will hear presentations by several water management organizations from neighboring states, including the Nebraska Association of Resources Districts, the Iowa Drainage District Association, the Lac Qui Parle-Yellowbank Watershed District, the Minnesota Association of Watershed Districts, the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources, the Red River Basin Commission, and State Senator Larry Luick of North Dakota. An opportunity for public testimony will be provided, and the public is urged to attend. On Sunday, Sept. 15, task force members will tour affected areas in Day, Grant, and Roberts counties. The Regional Watershed Advisory Task Force consists of 14 members: Rep. Brian Gosch, Chair (R-Rapid City); Sen. Mike Vehle, Vice Chair (R-Mitchell); Sens. Jason Frerichs (D-Wilmot), Tom Jones (D-Viborg), and Russell Olson (R-Wentworth); Reps. Dennis Feickert (D-Aberdeen), Spencer Hawley (D-Brookings), and Leslie Heinemann (R-Flandreau); and Dennis Duncan (Parker), Mike Jaspers (Sioux Falls), Rick Sommers (Aberdeen), Paul Symens (Amherst), George Vandel (Pierre), and Kim Vanneman (Ideal).

The City of Yankton Golf Advisory Board will meet at noon on Monday, Sept. 16, at the Fox Run Golf Course, 600 W. 27th St. This is an open meeting.

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In his reports, Hansen noted the change to local operation of the center carries expenses such as deferred maintenance, repairs and regular operating expenses such as utilities and salaries. Saturday's fundraising event at the Centerville Legion Hall includes a light supper and silent auction from 5-7 p.m. and a live auction at 7 p.m. A freewill offering will be taken for the supper. Many items for the silent auction have been donated, including items donated by some of the center's residents. The proceeds will pay for the sprinkler system and other costs. The public has responded with great items for the auctions, said Shelley Fox, the center's charge nurse and social services designee. "Things have really been coming in," she told the Press & Dakotan. "We have a lot of neat stuff. We have things like a half-hog, a small trip package, and (Minnesota) Vikings and (University of South Dakota) games." The live auction items include soybean seed donations, a toy tractor and a homemade quilt. Fundraisers are not new for the Centerville facility, Fox noted. The center has held its Winter Wonderland along with its annual waffle breakfast.

Saturday's fundraiser represents a larger effort to raise financial support, Fox said. "I expect we will have a major fundraiser every year," she said. Over the years, Centerville and the surrounding area has shown its support for the center not only in financial ways, Fox pointed out. "We have a number of programs for the residents and their families, and the community is very involved in the operation of the place," she said. "We have the ice cream social each year. At Christmas time, we have programs like 'Adopt a Resident' and the staff Christmas party for the families and residents." Saturday's fundraiser will continue the momentum which has gained steam in recent weeks, Fox predicted. "The Centerville economic development corporation took June 1 ownership of the nursing home," she said. "We have been doing really well, and there are some positive things." The center's census numbers were running the low 20s in 2011, but the number of residents has nearly doubled in the last one to two years, Fox said. "We are at 43 (residents) now, and we have remained around the 40 mark (in recent months)," she said. The center offers round-the-clock care, Fox said. The site operates under one roof with four wings, one of them as an assisted-living facility with 12 beds. The center offers 54 beds, and it currently has four openings in its long-term

care facility and two openings in its assisted-living facility, Fox added. The facility's staff members bring longevity to their work, with little turnover in some positions, Fox noted. The Centerville Care and Rehab Center will operate as an independent facility, she said. Chad Strochein of Carling Professionals is serving as executive administrator. Jenny King, the business office manager, is serving as interim administrator until a full-time replacement arrives Jan. 1. Centerville's effort to save its nursing facility has drawn statewide attention. Hansen was honored earlier this year with the Excellence in Economic Development Award, given out annually at the Governor's Economic Development Conference. "Bill Hansen helped lead the charge to save Centerville's nursing home and the jobs it provides," Gov. Dennis Daugaard said in a news release. Fox looks for good things to continue. "When I came to this facility about a year-and-a-half ago, I was in awe of what we do and have. I'm still that way," she said. "The bottom line for us is that Centerville has a very unique facility."

hoping for "a concrete result" from the talks. The back-and-forth was a stark indication of the challenging work ahead as Kerry, Lavrov and their teams of chemical weapons experts plunge into talks aimed at finding agreement on how to dismantle the chemical weapons amid the confusion and danger of Syria's civil war. Lavrov seemed to contradict Kerry's negative view of Syrian President Bashar Assad's offer to provide details on his country's chemical arsenal beginning 30 days after it signs an international convention banning such weapons. Syria's ambassador to the United Nations said that as of Thursday his country had become a full member of the treaty, which requires destruction of all chemical weapons. However, the United Nations said it will take at least another 30 days. The Russian said the initiative must proceed "in strict compliance with the rules that are established by the
