Yankton County showed a .8 percent decline in population, with an estimated 18,800 people in 1987. But DeVee Dykstra, director of the State Data Center, said Yankton had probably experienced growth since the 1987 estimate was made due to the opening of the federal prison camp.• The financial well-being of state-chartered banks would be improved if they were allowed to expand their services to include insurance, real estate and securities, South Dakota's top banking regulator has said.

the paint, so it was very little cost to us. We just provided the labor."

Akland said the group spent less than \$200 beyond the donations and that renovations only took around 4.5 hours and involved five total volunteers.

The next major project for GFWC will be helping prepare meals for Habitat For Humanity workers, Akland said.

Pooler said the group's work has really helped add to the shelter's ability to serve the community.

"I think it looks wonder-

ful," she said. "It gives it a fresh look. The people we work with are homeless so if we can make it look nice, clean, homey, it gives them a new perspective that hopefully they can take with them when they leave."

Pooler added that, while no major projects are planned at the moment, there will always be work to do around the shelter.

"It's like your own home and there's always something that needs repairing," she said.

Red Road Gathering 'Walk In Balance' Set For Vermillion

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota Department of Addiction Studies has announced that the 24th annual Red Road Gathering, "Walk in Balance," is Thursday, Sept. 19, and Friday, Sept. 20, at the National Guard Armory in Vermillion.

The event provides participants with a compassionate healing environment through culturally-based information and support activities. Designed for recovery, de-stressing and networking with colleagues, friends and participants, each Red Road Gathering session begins with a prayer and walking meditation at 7:30 a.m., followed by breakfast and the first speaker of the day at 9 a.m.

Speakers for "Walk in Balance" are Rick Thomas, Isanti tribe, co-developer of Red Road Approach; and Gene Thin D. Elk, Sicangu Lakota, and founder of Red Road Approach. Additional lecturers from Minnesota and South Dakota will share stories of healing as well as recovery information and skill sets for transitioning toward a healthful life. Performances will feature inter-tribal Native American drum groups and Lakota healing songs from the Wakinyan Maza Oka Singers, Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, Wohitika Singers, Menominee Nation of Wisconsin and Oyate Singers of Vermillion.

Memorial Service Set To Honor Donors To Body Donor Program

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota Sanford School of Medicine and the School of Health Sciences will honor donors to the Body Donor Program and their families during a special memorial service at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 20 at the atrium of the Andrew E. Lee Memorial Medical and Science Building.

This is the ninth year of the memorial service that honors family members by recognizing the contribution of their loved ones who gave a special gift to the study of medicine. Students from the medical, physician assistant, occupational therapy and physical therapy programs along with faculty and staff will share testimonials and show their appreciation to family members attending the memorial service.

"The memorial service is a unique opportunity for donors' families to know that their loved one was treated with care and respect," said event coordinator Carleen McNeely. "And that their loved one's gift

was not just a value to students and faculty in our program but to the study of medicine."

The Sanford School of Medicine and the School of Health Sciences relies on the voluntary donation of bodies for medical and other professional health programs. Body donations are crucial in teaching gross anatomy as the foundation for physicians, physician assistants, nurses, dentists, dental hygienists, occupational and physical therapists, and paramedics. Donors have served as the "first patient" for thousands of USD students.

"The anatomy laboratory is a unique educational experience, and the memorial service is an integral aspect of that experience," said Dr. Stuart Inglis, director of medical anatomical laboratories and the body donation program. "Students have an opportunity to express their gratitude to the donors' families, and to gain an appreciation of the rich and fulfilling lives that these people have led."

CERT Public Training Set For Tuesday

Yankton County's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is inviting area residents to learn more about the team's purpose and practices as part of their ongoing disaster response preparation. A public training night has been scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 17, at the Yankton County EMS building. It begins at 6 p.m. in the west parking lot.

Attendees will receive basic training in fire extinguisher operation, natural gas/propane threat assessment, basic triage practices and initial patient assessment.

Additionally, information about certified training to become an active member of the local CERT team will be made available.

Yankton County CERT educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help.

Yankton County CERT was established in 2012 and is one of 11 such teams in South Dakota.
