Hrycko Joins Yankton Media, Inc.

Yankton Media, Inc., is pleased to announce the hiring of Mike Hrycko as the new circulation director for its area publications. He took over the position Aug. 19. He replaced David Jeffcoat, who accepted a similar position with a newspaper group in northern California. Hrycko comes to the Yankton/Ver-million market from Chicago. He has been in the distribution field for 11 years, starting as a route manager for a circular distributor in Illinois and Indiana, and then running his own distribu-

tion company for a brief period. He then moved on to a neighborhood newspaper in Chicago (Chicago's Northwest Side Press & The Reporter/Journal) where he was hired as the circulation director but later expanded into the design and layout side of the publication. "After just over six years at that publication I decided it was time to move

on. I also wanted very badly to get away from the big city lifestyle," Hrycko said. "Yankton Media, Inc., showed an interest, and after visiting Yankton, I was sold. It's only been a couple of weeks but so far it's been better than I anticipated! I wish I had made this move sooner." Yankton Media, Inc., was formed in 2008 by Gary L. Wood, owner and publisher of the Yankton Daily Press & Dakotan, the Vermillion Plain Talk, the Missouri Valley Shopper and the Broadcaster.

The Fiddlers of South Dakota are hosting the 41st annual South Dakota Fiddle Contest Sept. 20-22 at the Yankton County 4-H Grounds (901 Whiting Drive, Yankton). Talented fiddlers and fans from across the North America will gather for a weekend of music and fun. The Friday evening session, beginning at 7 p.m., will showcase special performances by groups or individuals who would like to share their talents outside of a contest setting. This laid-back, fun, and entertaining evening is sure to be highly enjoyable by audience members and performers alike. Most of the weekend's contests occur on Saturday, starting at 9:30 a.m., including the South Dakota fiddle competition in five age divisions (young children, teens, adults, seniors, and those over 75), out-of-state fiddle competitions (the five same age divisions), harmonica, and button and keyboard accordion competitions. Accomplished and advanced fiddlers from across the United States will perform on Saturday evening. Each year, different artists are invited, many having professional careers in country music or bluegrass bands. Sunday morning features a gospel celebration at 10 a.m., with the stage open to any performers. Sunday afternoon's event is the twin fiddling competition, with teams of two facing off for the top team title. From experienced fiddle players to those who don't really know the difference between a fiddle and violin, everyone is invited.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mostly lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for December delivery rose 1.75 cents to \$6.43 a bushel; December corn fell 2.50 cents to \$4.54 a bushel; December oats were 4.75 cents lower at \$3.0675 a bushel; while November soybeans declined 5.75 cents to \$13.4250 a bushel. Beef and pork prices were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. October live cattle fell .30 cent to \$1.2517 a pound; October feeder cattle was 1.63 cents lower at \$1.5787 a pound; while October lean hogs were 1.15 cents lower at \$.9097 a pound.
