

### Husker Fan Or Not, Crofton's Peitz Ready For Jacks-Husker Showdown

Tom Peitz grew up in Husker country. He was raised to know the name Tom Osborne; to know who Tommie Frazier and Scott Frost were.

That doesn't mean, however, Peitz was a Nebraska football fan. 'For some reason, I was the odd-

ball out," he said Monday. Peitz, a Crofton, Neb., native, will

nonetheless take the field Saturday at Memorial Stadium as a redshirt freshman linebacker for South Dakota State. The Jackrabbits and Huskers will meet at 2:30 p.m.

Given that high school players across the state of Nebraska likely envision themselves playing at Memorial Stadium, yeah, not being a Husker fan is strange, Tom joked.

"That's everyone's dream," said Peitz, who has recorded seven tackles and one interception for SDSU this season. "They all want to go play for the Huskers. I just didn't see myself there at all.'

And not because he wasn't capable of suiting up for coach Bo Pelini's squad, but mostly because such opportunities are typically unlikely, according to Crofton High School

football coach Tony Hoffman. "Even just the dream of playing college football is a stretch," Hoffman said. "But to play for the Huskers, yeah, that's really rare."

Once players reach high school and realize Nebraska coaches won't be calling, reality sets in, Hoffman said.

"Heck, I'm still waiting for my call," he joked. "Everybody wants to

wear that red at some point in time." And the Peitz family is no different.

Tom is the fourth Peitz brother to go on to play college football, following in the footsteps of Greg (SDSU, 2002-04), Eric (Colorado State, 2007-10) and Matt (current SDSU senior long-snapper).

The quartet — another brother, Mike, didn't play college football joins a long list of former Crofton Warriors to continue their playing careers beyond the small northeast Nebraska school. They were all, also, coached by Hoffman.

"It doesn't matter where you go to, those are kids who put in the time; the effort and are determined to get better," Hoffman said. "We have former players in the NAIA, and it's the same thing.'

For the younger Peitz, he will now take the field against a program surrounded in turmoil this week - the UCLA loss last Saturday was coupled Monday with the disclosure of damning 2-year-old audio of Pelini.

They're going to come out firing. They want to make a statement," Peitz said. "For us, it's just another game, but we want to show the world that SDSU is for real.'

Three years ago, the Jackrabbits nearly pulled the upset in Lincoln, falling to the Huskers by a 17-3 score.

Come Saturday, we've got to try to do what we did in 2010," SDSU head coach John Stiegelmeier said Tuesday. "Play a good game and hopefully have a chance to stay close and maybe win it in the fourth quarter."

### Pelini Unsure If Punishment **Coming For Rant**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Ne-braska coach Bo Pelini said Tuesday he doesn't know if he'll be disciplined for his profane rant about Cornhuskers fans two years ago, adding that he expects most will continue to support him.

An audio of Pelini's tirade leaked to the website Deadspin has Big Red fans buzzing.

Pelini issued an apology in a statement Monday night and reiterated it during the Big Ten coaches' teleconference on Tuesday.

Chancellor Harvey Perlman has expressed disappointment in Pelini but declined to comment when asked if the coach would be disciplined. Athletic director Shawn Eichorst said he was "disheartened."

Pelini said he has met with Eichorst and spoken on the phone with Perlman about the audio. He did not elaborate.

The Huskers play FCS South Dakota State on Saturday in Lincoln.

"I fully anticipate coaching this weekend," Pelini said after practice. "I'm the head football coach until someone savs different.

Pelini said on the teleconference he was shocked by the release of the audio, though he indicated he knew a potentially damaging audio existed.

Pelini said he might lose some fan support, but that he was confident many would understand that his comments were made during what he thought was a private conversation before his radio show after the Huskers' 34-27 win over Ohio State in October 2011.

"I think I've built up enough points with our fans over the last five years in how I've conducted myself, how I've run this program and what we've done with this program to earn some forgiveness for something that was made in a private setting," Pelini said. "People will understand this isn't how I feel about the fans. I've said it over and over.

The Deadspin audio caught Pelini speaking off air with Husker Sports Network play-by-play man Greg Sharpe and associate athletic director for community relations

# **Jimmies Rally Past MMC**

The University of Jamestown came into the 2013 season ranked 16th in the NAIA men's soccer preseason poll. For 60 minutes, Mount Marty College played right with them.

Jamestown scored twice in a seven-minute span in the second half and added a late goal for a 4-1 victory over the Lancers on Tuesday at Easton Field.

"They are a very talented team. They have good size and speed at every position," Mount Marty head coach Nathan Epp said of the Jimmies. "They pass extremely well."

Jamestown took an early lead when Zach O'Dell stole the ball deep in Lancer territory and fed Dominic O'Connor for a goal. But the Mount Marty defense settled in and kept Jamestown at bay the rest of the half.

The more experienced Jimmies had just an 8-5 edge in shots in the opening stanza.

'We came out in the first half and had one of our better efforts," Epp said. "I was happy with the defense, but we had to be more aggressive

Jamestown's Nicole Ladoucer stopped two shots in goal in the shutout. Mount Marty, now 0-6-1 begins Great Plains Athletic Conference play at Concordia on Saturday. As league play begins, the Lancers are still looking for some answers, Epp noted. 'We're moving things around, trying people in differente positions," he said. "I thought we played solid defense, but we struggled connecting passes," said Mount Marty head coach Nathan Epp. "We had a couple of opportunities, but we struggled to get shots on goal. We never tested their keeper."

Jamestown possessed the ball on Mount Marty's side of the field for much of the first half, but didn't break into the scoring column until Tiffany

In the second half, Jamestown's Kara Wahl broke away and put away a pass from teammate Monica Noria for a goal in the 54th minute. Five minutes later. Hannah Langseth stole the ball near the Lancer goal and put it

away The Lancers did not have a shot on goal in the second half.

"In the last 20 minutes, we lost our energy," Epp said. "We gave them several opportunties.

Mount Marty goalkeeper Courtney True stopped 11 shots in the match.

She did a fantastic job,' Epp said of the sophomore from Yankton. "In the last 20 minutes, she really held us together.'

True said that the Lancers are working hard to deal with some early-season injuries.

"Everyone's trying hard," she said. "We're starting to step up as a team."

"We're hoping for a 'W," she said. "We're finally figuring out what we need to do, and we're hoping to prove a bunch of people wrong this year."

Pelini criticized fans who left the stadium in the third quarter, when the Huskers trailed 27-6. Nebraska's comeback was the biggest in program history.

Pelini also used profanity while criticizing two Omaha World-Herald sports writers. Pelini had dressed down one of the writers in his postgame news conference that night for writing what he thought was an overly critical column about quarterback Taylor Martinez.

In the days before the Ohio State game, Pelini faced withering criticism for the Huskers' performance the week before in a 31-point loss at Wisconsin.

Pelini repeatedly used expletives while talking on the audio about "fair-weather" fans and how the day is com-
