eastern two-thirds of the country, Foster said. The forecast calls for above-normal chances for precipitation across the Northern Plains and the northern Midwest.

October calls for abovenormal temperatures and precipitation in the Plains and Midwest, Foster said.

We expect areas of drought to persist," he said. There will be improvement in some areas on the periphery of the Midwest and Great Plains.'

Foster sees some good news for the Great Plains.

"Over a longer period of time, the message is clear that we have a very rapid and intensifying dryness in the Midwest and some relief as we move further out into the Plains," he said.

Another speaker on Thursday's conference call looked at the drought's impact on the fall harvest.

'We have seen a resur-

gence of drought in the short term, which will affect a good chunk of the Corn Belt. As we head to the west, the drought becomes increasingly long term," said Brad Rippey from the Joint Agricultural Weather Facility.

The facility, housed at the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), was formed in 1978 by the World Board and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, approximately 55 percent of the U.S. corn production area lies within drought areas, Rippey said.

The Central Plains region remains a major corn producer, with 85 percent of the U.S. corn crop traditionally coming from the region, he

added. The 55 percent of the nation's corn crop in drought areas represents a sharp increase from the low mark of 17

percent in July, Rippey said. Even with the increasingly dry conditions, this year's corn crop looks much more promising than last year, he

"Nationally, 18 percent of the U.S. corn crop is very poor to poor," he said. "Last year, it was 50 percent.'

Meanwhile, 45 percent of the nation's soybeans are located in drought areas, Rippey said. In addition, 53 percent of the nation's domestic cattle inventory is located in drought

This year's late-planted crops will need to deal with the possibility of a frost and freeze situation, Rippey said. "This time of year, the temperatures are low enough to be a concern for immature corn," he said.

Late-planted soybeans could take even more of a hit than corn, he said.

The dry conditions aren't likely to subside anytime soon, Foster said.

"During the fall and winter months, it should remain relatively dry," he said. "If there is above-normal precipitation, it won't be to an extent big enough to recharge in those (drought) areas.
