Project Connect Coming Sept. 24

Project Connect, sponsored by the newly formed Yankton Homeless Coalition, will bring information regarding services of all sorts to one location on September 24th. People who walk through the doors can get help ranging from housing information, credit counseling services available or to how to get in touch with social services.

The Yankton Homeless Coalition, whose mission is to prevent involuntary homelessness by fostering partnerships and developing creative solutions, started gathering this summer to start the conversation about inadequate housing and homelessness in

Coalition members include representatives from the City of Yankton, Yankton Police Dept., Homeless Shelter, Yankton Women's & Children's Center, Yankton Housing, Habitat for Humanity, Department of Social Services, SD Human Services Center, The Contact Center, Planning & Development District III, Family Education and Counseling Center, LSS Consumer Credit Counseling, Head Start and United Way & Volunteer Services.

The problem is that most struggling individuals or families are employed, yet they're not making enough money to be able to afford food and rent, so they're stretching one or the other,' Julie Dykstra member of the Yankton Homeless Coalition and Executive Director of Yankton Habitat for Humanity

Dvkstra says unfortunately the problems regarding inadequate housing in the area are growing, making events like Project Connect increasingly more important.

There are approximately 700 working households that spend more than thirty five percent of their income on their housing. These are cost burdened households. They are just this close. One little bump in the road could push them over," Dykstra said.

While the service providers at Project Connect can't change everything, this convenient event can help start the turnaround of a tough situation.

According to Nathan Johnson, Board member of the Yankton Homeless Shelter and Coalition member, "Project Connect serves a dual purpose. It is a way for those without housing or without adequate housing to learn about the services available to assist them. It also gives the agencies providing services a clearer picture of the population they are serving so they can better plan for the future. I think it will be an important learning experience for everyone

involved." Yankton Homeless Coalition member and Yankton Police Lt. Todd Brandt, agrees saving that "it is important to gain an understanding of individuals or families that are in need of housing, but don't know where to go for assistance. We as a Coalition want to figure out solutions and provide that information to those that are in need.'

The first annual Project Connect will be held at the United Church of Christ on Tuesday, September 24th from 5:00 to 7:00pm. Free pizza, sponsored by Wal-Mart, Pizza Ranch, Little Caesars, and Godfathers will be provided. Local gardeners are also donating fresh vegetables to share.


FFA Chapter Receives Grant
