

# Jackrabbits Don't Expect To Be Awestruck In Return To Lincoln

Three years ago, South Dakota State walked onto the Memorial Stadium field and nearly beat the sixthranked Huskers. The final score that day was 17-3.

So no, the Jackrabbits don't figure to be awestruck in today's (Saturday) 2:30 p.m. matchup with embattled —

and unranked — Nebraska in Lincoln,

'With them being a bigger school, teams can get intimidated by just hearing Nebraska," said SDSU junior offensive lineman Trevor Greger, a Wagner native. "You just have to keep your mind on they're a football team just like you.'

The Huskers (2-1) have, however, been mired in a rough week.

On top of a 41-21 blowout loss to UCLA in Lincoln, Nebraska head coach Bo Pelini found himself not only battling former standout Tommie Frazier over a critical tweet but answering for 2-year-old leaked audio littered with expletives.

Meanwhile, the sixth-ranked Jackrabbits (3-0) have focused only on football.

"I think what's going on down there, them having lost to UCLA at home, is potentially good for us, in terms of our pressure and distraction and all the talk," head coach John Stiegelmeier said this week.

Instead, the Jackrabbits are seeking their first FBS win in their sixth try. SDSU has been close, though, losing by three at Minnesota (2009), by 14 at Nebraska (2010) and by 14 at Kansas (2012).

'They're going to come out firing.

They want to make a statement," said redshirt freshman linebacker Tom Peitz, a native of Crofton, Neb. "For us, it's just another game, but we want to show the world that SDSU is for real.'

Nebraska, on the other hand, naturally wants to rise the ranks in the Big Ten Conference.

If last week's loss showed one thing, it was that the Huskers struggle against the pass. A year ago, Nebraska's defense limited opposing quarterbacks to a 46.8 completion

#### Soccer: Coyotes, UND Play To 2-2 Draw GRAND FORKS, N.D. half. Junior Colleen Reeves

South Dakota soccer fought back from an early two-goal deficit to earn a 2-2 tie against North Dakota Friday afternoon at Bronson Field. It is the third straight year the Coyotes and UND have played to a tie.

North Dakota (1-7-1) scored two goals in a span of 35 seconds 10 minutes into the match. It marked the secondfastest margin between two goals in UND history.

Robyn Wujkowski received a pass from Caitlin Dahl and chipped a shot over USD goalkeeper Mackenzie Viktor to score her second goal of the season. After the restart, UND hit the right post with the shot and Andrea Hyduke was there

for the rebound and the score. "They (UND) came out hard

and strong," said USD head coach Mandy Green. "After that happened, we settled down, started passing the ball along and generated a lot of scoring opportunities.'

The Coyotes (4-2-3) took 19 shots and placed eight on goal. Ten of those shots came in the second half.

USD sophomore Elena Tsakakis cut the lead in half with a goal in the 34th minute. Tsakakis was on the end of a string of passes that set up the score. After Taylor Nivala worked it to Tsakakis, she took a couple dribbles towards the goal and hit a shot past UND goalkeeper Kristi Hestdalen.

The score remained 2-1 until sophomore Danielle Anderson netted the equalizer less than five minutes into the second

### **Pettitte's Take On His Own Hall Of Fame Resume**

NEW YORK (AP) — Andy Pettitte has never thought of himself as a Hall of Fame pitcher. Now that he's announced his plans to retire after this season, an interesting debate will begin.

The New York Yankees left-hander is 255-152 with a 3.86 ERA in 18 major league seasons. That makes him one of 26 pitchers — the only one still active — with a record at least 100 games over .500.

Eighteen of those pitchers are in the Hall of Fame, and five who aren't have not been retired long enough to appear on the ballot. According to STATS, the only exceptions are Bob Caruthers, who went 217-98 from 1884-1893, and Roger Clemens, a 354-game winner tainted by steroids allegations.

Pettitte admitted using human growth hormone years ago, saying he tried the banned substance in an effort to recover faster from an injury.

"I don't think about the Hall of Fame unless someone asks me," he said Friday, adding he's grateful just to be mentioned in that conversation with other stars such as Yankees teammates Mariano Rivera and Derek Jeter. "I've had the success that I've had because of so many great players that have been around me.'

Craig Bohl is having the time of his life at North Dakota State. His program is bidding to join Appalachian State as the only

schools to win three straight Championship Subdivision titles. There was that season-opening victory over Kansas State. And this week ESPN's popular College GameDay show is setting up shop in downtown Fargo, N.D., in advance of the Bison's game against Delaware State.

"This," Bohl said, "is the most fun I've had."

Even more fun than winning national championships as an assistant coach in 1995 and '97 at Nebraska, his alma mater?

Yes, the 55-year-old Bohl said, because North Dakota State has risen to the pinnacle of the FCS only nine years after beginning the transition from Division

Along the way the Bison have won seven of 10 games against the Bowl Subdivision. The stunning 24-21 victory on Big 12 champion K-State's home field raised North Dakota State's profile to new heights, more than

"All the stars aligned," Bohl said. "It was great exposure for NDSU and it's going to have a long-term effect in recruiting and a positive effect on our athletic department. GameDav has been here all week. That exposure for our school. I don't know how you measure the value of it."

A win over Delaware State would be Bohl's 92nd and make him the career leader at North Dakota State, a program with a long history of success built on the backs of players mostly from North Dakota, Minnesota and

Wisconsin. When we made the transition to Division I, football was the one sport we wanted to get as successful as we could as soon as we could," athletic director Gene Taylor said. "It was the revenue driver. But to think we were going to go out after a few years since the transition and win back-to-back national championships, I don't know if anyone

could envision that." Bohl, whose first full-time assistant coaching job was at NDSU in 1984, interviewed with

Taylor after he was let go as Nebraska's defensive coordinator in 2002. Bohl was a reserve defensive back for the Huskers in the late 1970s, and he said former Nebraska coach Tom Osborne remains his mentor.

During his interview, Bohl told Taylor that he planned to model the program after Osborne's teams. That meant emphasizing physical play on both sides of the ball and focusing on player development.

As Osborne did, Bohl makes sure to lock up top in-state players. Bohl visits each of the 94 football-playing high schools across North Dakota every May. Though only four starters are from North Dakota, 11 of the 22 players on the two-deep chart are from the state.

You're not going to find a lot of our players on the Rivals.com number-of-stars list," Bohl said. "Very few of them have had FBS or BCS offers. Most of the time they are guys who have been overlooked by a Big Ten or Big 12 school. But they have the work ethic and determination, and I think our program has done a good job developing that within a system."
