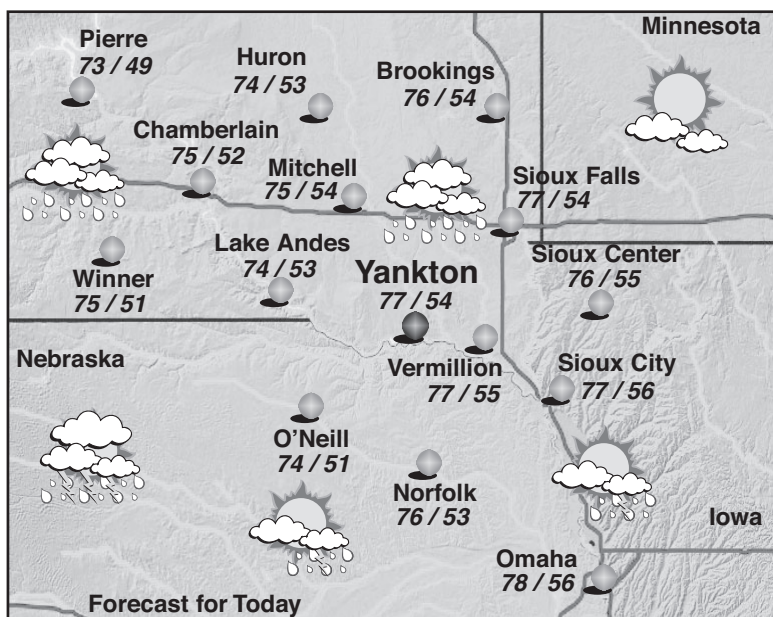

## Community/State To Celebrate Manufacturing

When manufacturing employs 18.4 percent of a community's workforce — that means it has a major impact on everyone. Manufacturing is one of the four major industries that contribute to the economy of Yankton and this year that industry will be celebrated during Sept. 30-Oct. 4.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard will be proclaiming that week as South Dakota Manufacturing Week and it will culminate with National Manufacturers Day on Oct. 4. The Governor's Office of Economic Development is working on events across the state to help raise awareness of what this industry does for the state and is encouraging communities to join in. "This is a great opportunity for Yankton to showcase our manufacturing sector and the impact it has on not only the local economy but statewide as well as globally" states Chamber Executive Director Carmen Schramm. Yankton has 2.5 times the national average of manufacturers with over \$19,704,294 in taxable sales last year.

A manufacturing committee, with representatives from the Chamber, RTEC (Regional Technical Education Center), S.D. Department of Labor and Regulation and several manufacturers has been created to help coordinate events for that week. With the manufacturing of products from compound bows to aggregate rock crushers, the week for Yankton's celebration was decided to be themed

"Manufacturing - It Touches Everyone."

The week will include daily public tours and tours for high school students. The dates of the public tours are as follows:

Media interviews will take place during the week to educate the public on the products that are manufactured locally and how those products impact daily lives. There will be a Facebook campaign highlighting Yankton manufacturers and their finished products. Local access channels for Midcontinent Communication Channel 3 and WOW! Channel 98 will showcase local manufacturing videos.

Through the support of Yankton Area Progressive Growth, Inc. several videos will be produced for this industry. The videos will be used for workforce recruitment, manufacturing awareness and quality of life messages to be used by the industry, the Chamber and YAPG in their economic development efforts.

The week-long event will end on Friday, Oct. 4, with a luncheon at The Old Mill, 104 Capitol St. The Old Mill was the location of the Excelsior Mills which was one of the first manufacturing plants in Yankton back in 1872.

The keynote speaker will be Lt. Gov. Matt Michels. There will be a manufacturing panel featuring Tom Bohnet of Applied Engineering, Inc., Jeff May of Kolberg-Pioneer, Inc., and Mike Husman of Vishay Dale Electronics, Inc. who will discuss workforce issues, challenges and opportunities facing the manufacturing industry. The Planning and Development District III will facilitate the panel and public discussion.

Among its distinctions are the Conservatory of Music, the School of Theology, the astronomical Clark Observatory, the first U.S. Shakespearean Outdoor Garden Terrace Theatre, influential faculty and a record breaking athletic program.

Yankton College continues shaping the lives of many students by awarding scholarships annually from endowed funds and sponsoring educational programs. Contact still remains with more than 3,000 alumni.

## Menno Band Day Set To March On Friday

MENNO — Area bands will return to Menno for the seventh annual Menno Band Day on Friday, Sept. 27.

Fifteen middle school and high school bands will be participating in this street marching competition, with the Menno Wolves Marching Band and "The Pride of the Dakotas" South Dakota State University Marching Band providing guest performances throughout the day.

Two middle school bands (Tea and Lennox), are in their own division. Six bands will compete in the B class: Viborg-Hurley, Chester, Irene-Wakona, Freeman, Parker, and Howard. Finally, six bands will compete in the A-

division: Sioux Falls Christian, Tea, Lennox, Beresford, Tri-Valley, and West Central.

The parade starts at 10 a.m. with the Menno Wolves Marching Band leading the way. Middle School Bands will start off the competition. B-class will then take the street, followed by the A-class. "The Pride of the Dakotas" will be the last performance of the parade. Bands will start their route at the corner of E. Heil St. and South High St., proceeding west until S. Fifth St. Bands will then march south on S. Fifth St. until Juniper St. and turn right, marching past bands that marched prior to them and ending the route.

Bands participating in competition will be judged by Bob Goheen (formerly of Brandon Valley), Bob Carlson (formerly of Sioux Falls Lincoln) and Jim McKinney (formerly of SDSU). Scores will be given in the areas of Marching Execution, Music Execution, and General Effect. Additionally, four caption awards will be presented to the Outstanding Drum Line, Outstanding Color Guard, and Outstanding Drum Majors. A Crowd-Pleaser award is given out to the most entertaining performance of the day.
