## City Works On Proposed **Animal Ordinance**

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A proposed animal ordinance received a thorough vetting Monday by members of the Yankton City Commission and the public.

During a work session prior to the commission's regular meeting, a page-by-page review of the document was completed in advance of considering it for adoption.

The process was a learning experience about both current and proposed animal laws in the city, with several commissioners admitting they may not be in full compliance with the rules now on the books.

Early in the proceedings, Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen called the proposal a "comprehensive" ordinance.

He also advised the commission that he is opposed to any breed-specific laws, such as a ban on pitbulls. The statement was met

with agreement from others present. Among those in attendance were a U.S. Postal Service employee, representatives of animal rescues, a veterinarian and those having problems with neighboring pets.

The proposed 30-page ordinance was first reviewed by the City Commission in August after it was introduced by City Attorney David Hosmer.

He informed them that multiple animal ordinance issues have arisen, beginning more or less since day one of his working for the municipality several years ago.

He collaborated with the Yankton Police Department and the Community Development Office to review the current ordinance and draft a new one.

A discussion was held Monday about expanding the options for pet owners to obtain licenses for their cats and dogs in the hopes that more people go through the licensing

About 600 pet licenses have been issued by the city this year, but it is estimated there

are 3,500 cats and dogs owned by people in the community.

Currently, pet owners have to go to the police station every January with a rabies vaccination certificate to get the license.

The possibility of allowing veterinarians and animal rescues to license pets and adding that information to a database maintained by the city was discussed. Additionally, it was suggested that the license be good for a year from the time it is issued,

rather than according to the calendar year. The length of the licensing period could also be adjusted to two or three years, so it is more in accordance with the typical schedule in which animals receive rabies vaccinations.

A variety of other changes to, or clarifications of, the proposed ordinance were also

One area that could generate discussion in the public is limitations on the number of pets. The proposed ordinance states that no person may possess in any dwelling unit within the city more than three adult dogs or more than any mix of six domesticated animals. A dog or cat is considered an adult at six months of age.

Hosmer took notes on the multitude of proposed changes and said he will make those adjustments in the next couple of

According to Wenande, the commission as a whole will have an extended session to discuss and approve any major policy changes included in the proposed ordinance. She anticipates that will occur in October.

Once that is complete, the ordinance would have to go through a public hearing process before receiving final approval.
