"This stretch of highway within the City of Yankton is very busy, and it borders our historic downtown district, which we hope will continue to attract more pedestrian and bike traffic in the years ahead. With the removal of the stop light at Fourth and Walnut, the speed will only increase, and expanding the highway will make it even more dangerous."

Stevens has a law office along Highway 50 near Douglas Avenue. In August, a letter to the editor about the Highway 50 plans written by his law partner John Blackburn was published in the Press & Dakotan.

the Executive Board decided to seek the review. Fry said that decision by the board was "a complete surprise." So he stayed to see the review through to its conclusion.

"We're moving forward," Carson said as the meeting concluded.

The NCSL report covers 55 pages including the supplementary material. The main flaws found by the reviewers were dissatisfaction with LRC staff's errors in bill and amendment drafting and the office's general approach of non-partisanship.

Fifty of the 105 legislators participated in NCSL's official survey. That raised a question for Sen. Larry Lucas, D-Mission. Lucas also noted that ratings were consistently higher from Democrats than Republicans for Fry and the LRC staff. Democrats consistently rated them at 4 or higher on a 1-5 scale, while Republicans were in the 3-plus to 4-plus depending on the question.

The report makes 12 recommendations. The staffing recommendations include hiring a drafting lawyer, a legal editor-proofreader and another information-technology person. The board decided to wait on those steps until a permanent successor to Schoenfeld has been hired and has time on the job.

The reviewers were specifically asked by the board to assess adding partisan staff, but the report concludes the LRC staff should be strengthened first and partisan staff "are not required to fulfill the kinds of services desired by legislators and legislative leaders.'

The report however specifically faulted the lack of performance appraisals for the LRC staff. The board in 2010 directed that appraisals be done but it didn't happen. Fry said Wednesday he didn't see the point of appraisals

Fourth Street, causing loss of the three-foot buffer zone between the curb and the sidewalk," Blackburn stated in the letter. "This puts sidewalks next to semi-truck traffic — within three feet of 30 mph traffic. This will create danger, inconvenience, snow piles on sidewalks and splashing of pedestrians. It will cut the lane size from 12-foot to 11-foot lanes and remove three feet of boulevard on each side.

The legislators are requesting that 12-foot lanes be installed to ensure the safety of motorists.

"We certainly support and appreciate the construction project, but we think it is imperative that the design be much more pedestrianfriendly and not detract from the private property — both residential and commercial along the route west of Burleigh," they state. "We question the need for a fifth lane when it comes at such an expense to property owners and pedestrian safety.

Unfortunately, the LRC has not kept pace with this changing landscape and the quality and responsiveness of some of its services have suffered. The Legislature's Executive Board and legislative leaders also have missed opportunities to set clear objectives for LRC staff and enforce accountability when LRC services and performances have not met expectations.

'It's our tax money that's going to Israel that's being used to beat up on the Palestinians," Abourezk said. Weir said the issue has become so polarizing for Americans due to strong pro-Israeli lobbies and a lack of knowledge on the subject. There's a group (of people) that are fanatically pro-Israel and work to do everything they can to prevent the whole information getting to the American public," she said. "The rest of us don't know much about it, don't want to offend friends that might be very pro-Israel and so most of us don't get involved and don't really learn that we are involved in it."
