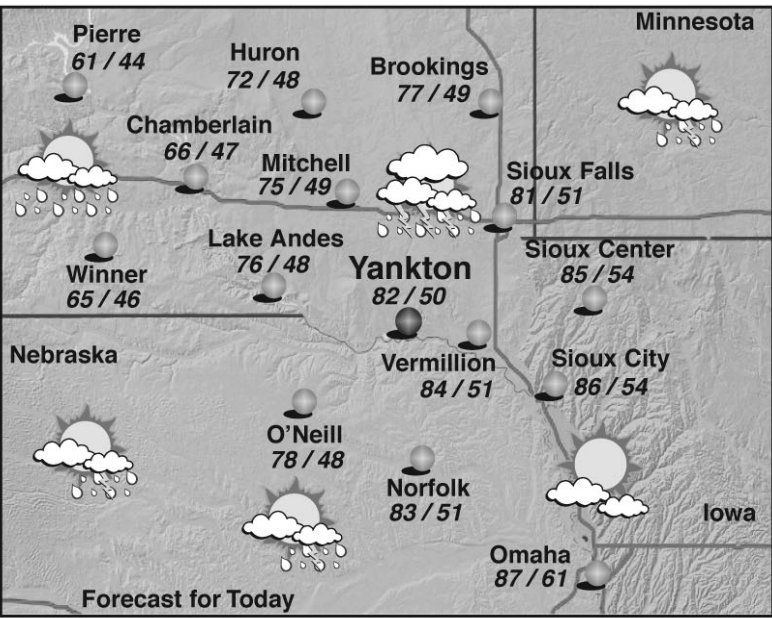

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Moser, president of the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce board of directors, told the Press & Dakotan. "Carmen has done an excellent job in her role as director of member services. She has exceeded our expectations, and she is committed to the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce, as well as the entire community. Carmen has a passion for what she does, which made her a natural choice to take on this new leadership role. She has the knowledge, skills and ability to perform the duties required of this new position."

She said her board voted unanimously to promote Schramm.

"On behalf of the entire Chamber board of directors, I would like to say that we are pleased that Carmen accepted the position, and we are looking forward to working with Carmen in her new, expanded role," Moser stated.

With changes in what the Chamber does in recent years, Schramm said it has resulted in

some confusion in the community that she is trying to remedy. For example, it no longer raises funds for the Fourth of July fireworks and has discontinued its annual Customer Appreciation Day.

"The world for business is changing so rapidly that chambers need to change with it," Schramm said. "We have been moving away from being what you would call a marketing-driven Chamber that does events and other things, to a Chamber that works strictly on business issues. We're a watchdog for changes that are happening."

"The biggest challenge to business right now is over-regulation," she continued. "Our role at the Chamber is to help businesses understand those issues and be an advocate for them if they are running into problems. That puts us in a different position than chambers were 20 years ago."

Schramm said the organization operates on membership dues, and that means the Chamber must focus on services the members want and need.

"In the general consumers' eye, they probably look at the Chamber as being a catch-all for every community event," she stated.

Some people think the Chamber is under the City of Yankton's umbrella or that it runs Riverboat Days. Neither is true.

"But if there is something happening out there, we probably touch on it in one way, shape or form," Schramm said. "We are able to answer a lot of questions about Riverboat Days. With the 125th state anniversary coming up, we are involved in those conversations. Are we running the events? Not totally. There are usually separate committees that are doing that."

The Chamber maintains more than 400 members — approximately 75 percent of which are small businesses with less than 10 employees — and it has volunteer committees that address a variety of issues. They include agri-business, ambassadors, business development, community health and safety, education, governmental affairs, transportation and women community leaders.

"If we didn't have volunteers working on those committees, we wouldn't get a third of the stuff done that we do," Schramm said.

One of the major tasks Schramm has ahead of her in

the next year is rolling out the Chamber's new membership structure. She said the current structure, which is based on the number of employees and the kind of profession, is antiquated.

"We need to keep up with what people are requesting," Schramm said. "We're going to have between eight and 10 packages. These packages include sponsorships for certain things, but it has nothing to do with employees any longer. It will take us a good year to get through all of our membership. It's going to take a one-on-one sales call with each business to go through the changes. I'm sure people will have plenty of questions, but we think it will increase the number of memberships because it will make it easier to understand."

She hopes that local businesses continue to keep the Chamber in mind as a resource.

"If you were to put it in a nutshell, we are here for business," Schramm said.

Victims Of Double-Fatal Crash Identified

MITCHELL (AP) — The South Dakota Highway Patrol has identified two people killed in a fiery head-on collision on state Highway 37 near Mitchell.

The patrol says 82-year-old Donald Geidel, of Dimock, was driving a pickup truck, and 23-year-old Sara Claggett, of Tripp, was driving a van that drifted into Geidel's lane. Both drivers died. Claggett's 2-year-old daughter was hospitalized in Sioux Falls with life-threatening injuries.

Witnesses say a man who came upon the accident used a knife to cut a seat belt and remove the girl from the burning van.

The crash happened about 4 p.m. Wednesday. Smoke could be seen from several miles away.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery rose 7.75 cents to \$6.7825 a bushel; December corn rose 2 cents to 4.5675 a bushel; December oats were 4.75 cents higher at \$3.185 a bushel; while November soybeans fell 5 cents to \$13.1675 a bushel.

Beef was higher while pork prices dropped on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle rose .30 cent to \$1.3157 a pound; November feeder cattle was up 1.10 cents to \$1.6515 a pound; while December lean hogs were .88 cent lower at \$.8772 a pound.

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the Associated General Contractors group. AGC's original plan would have somewhat reduced the system's reserves rather than allowing for minor growth.

The new proposal blends a piece of the AGC proposal and a piece of an earlier proposal from Roberts' staff.

Businesses won't have much time before the Monday meeting to analyze any of the original four proposals or the latest one. The meeting is probably the last for the council before the legislative session begins in January.

The council's decision, if there is one Monday, might be based more on philosophy than detailed dollars-and-cents forecasts.

"It's so individual that it's a difficult thing to explain to employers until they get the bill," Roberts told the council Tuesday.
