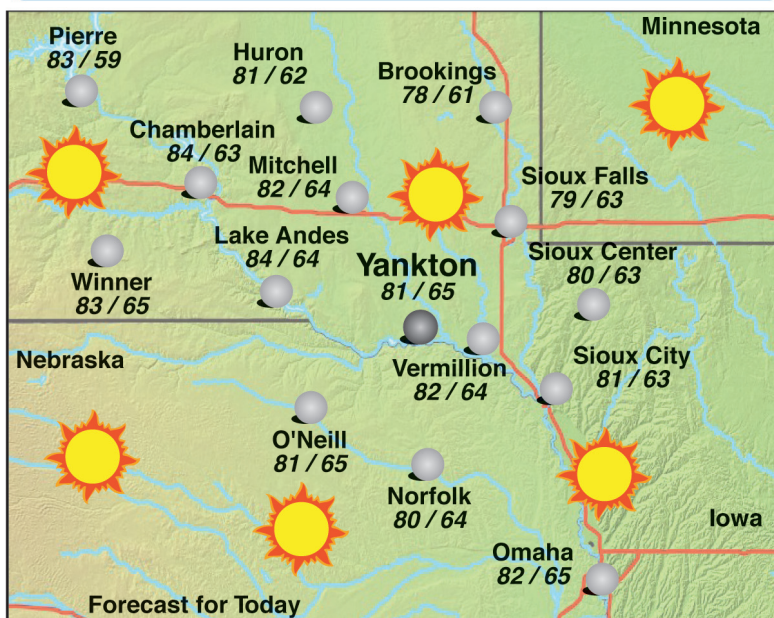

## Schoolhouse Celebration In Vermillion Wednesday

VERMILLION — A grand celebration and dedication of the first permanent school house in Dakota Territory, now relocated to Vermillion, will be held Wednesday, Sept. 3, with a lawn party at the Austin-Whittemore property, located at 15 Austin St. The lawn will be held from 4-7 p.m. There will be a ribbon-cutting and a program at 5:15 p.m. Tours will be given. The building was first constructed in 1864. Through the years, the long-abandoned log school house had fallen into disrepair. In the last decade, Vermillion area officials formulated a plan to move the schoolhouse. The building had to be razed and reconstructed. Hawkins Construction of Vermillion was hired by Clay County Historical Society to rebuild the school using locally milled cottonwood logs and old-time construction techniques, principally by Gene Hawkins and Jim Stone. Some of the original furnishings were salvaged and are being used in the new structure.

## Wagon Train Beginning In Yankton

PIERRE — The 125th statehood anniversary wagon train will begin in Yankton next week. Before the wagon train leaves on Thursday, Sept. 4, the public is invited to attend a Yankton statehood celebration. The quasiquintennial celebration will take place at the Yankton rodeo grounds in the afternoon and evening on Wednesday, Sept. 3. From 1 to 5 p.m., tours will be offered at Yankton's museum-in-progress in the Mead Building. Wagon rides will be provided from the rodeo grounds to the nearby museum. A special music and history program hosted by Terry Crandall will begin at 4 p.m. The program will include remarks from Gov. Dennis Daugaard, a speech by wagonmaster Gerald Kessler, a re-enactment of the first governor by actor John Timm, songs by the Beadle School first-graders, music by local country singers Rachel Wood and Ashley Schweitzer and performances by singer Mike McDonald and re-enactors from the Missouri National Recreation River. A chicken dinner will be served from 5-7 p.m., with proceeds going to the Dakota Territorial Museum. Tickets may be obtained in advance at the museum in Westside Park. Tickets may also be purchased at the event on a first-come, first-served basis. A concert and dance will be held from 7-10 p.m., featuring the country/folk songs of Poker Alice. Except the meal, all activities are free. Everyone is encouraged to dress in western wear, contemporary or historic.
