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#### Suspect In Motel Shooting Still At Large

RAPID CITY (AP) — Police in Rapid City say they are still searching for the 28-year-old male suspect in a motel shooting.

Police say the suspect in the Sunday morning shooting at the Colonial Motel has two other active warrants. One warrant is for aggravated eluding, DUI and reckless discharge or possession of a firearm while intoxicated, and the other is for failure to comply with a sentence.

Authorities say no one was injured during the incident at the motel.

The Rapid City and Pennington County Special Response Team was dispatched shortly after the incident to a residential area where authorities believed the suspect was hiding. Officers entered a home, but the man was not in-

#### School Helping Native American Artists

SIOUX FALLS (AP) - Researchers at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology are using 3-D imaging and other modern tools to reveal the history of Lakota artifacts.

They're also testing how to ensure the authenticity of those works through the use of invisible marks. The effort includes staff at the Center for Security Print-

ing and Anti-Counterfeiting Technology, which is developing new ways to guard against forged money, pharmaceuticals, electronics and other items.

Researchers can test the items without disturbing them, which is important for both cultural sensitivities and when handling delicate items, such as a child's moccasin from the 1890 Wounded Knee Massacre and a century-old pouch.

The researchers have also started testing how to put invisible QR codes on artwork and other valuable pieces to prove they're authentic.

#### One Man Killed in Lincoln Shooting

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Police in Lincoln are investigating an overnight shooting that left one man dead.

Police tell the Lincoln Journal Star that 21-year-old Maurice Lamont Williams died after he was shot with a handgun just before 1 a.m. Saturday. Police say the shooting happened inside LionsGate Apartments, where Williams lived.

Capt. Bob Farber says police received reports of the shooting just after 1 a.m. When officers arrived at the apartment, they found Williams with a gunshot wound. He was taken to Bryan West Campus in Lincoln, where he

# Many Residents Quit Hunting **Pheasants Before Population Drop**

PIERRE - License sales show pheasant hunting lost popularity among South Dakota hunters in recent years.

Only 57,677 South Dakotans bought licenses that could be used for hunting in 2013. That was the smallest number in 40 years or more.

Lower sales have become a trend.

In the past five seasons, South Dakotans bought less than 70,000 licenses every year except 2010.

License sales hadn't been below 70,000 for at least 40 years.

The 57,677 sold in 2014 was less than half of the 126,000 sold in 1974.

The long decline in sales of resident licenses coincides with the gradual increase in non-resident hunters visiting South Dakota.

Sales in 1993 were 78,900 residents and 45,500 non-residents.

From 1994 to 2008, resident sales stayed in a fairly tight band, ranging between a low of 70,573 in 1997, to a high of 84,342 in 1999.

Meanwhile non-resident sales skyrocketed.

They jumped nearly 20,000 for the 1994 season, hitting 65,200. After a dip in 1997 to 42,808, they took off again and kept climbing.

Non-residents outnumbered South Dakotans for the first time in 2002. That has been the case ever since. Non-residents reached a record of 103,231 in 2007 while South Dakotans num-

bered 77,879. From 2004 through 2012, non-residents

bought more than 90,000 licenses every

The sharp drop in pheasant population in 2013 saw both sets of hunters fall off.

South Dakotans dropped to 57,677 from 69,240 in 2013, while non-residents plummeted to 74,424 from 93,801 in 2012.

The annual road survey ahead of the 2013 season found 1.52 birds per mile, the smallest since 1.81 in 1986 and a four-year stretch in the mid-1970s.

Pheasants per mile bounced up and down repeatedly during the 20 seasons prior to 2013, ranging as low as the middle-2s six times to as high as the 5-to-8 range nine times

State Game, Fish and Parks Department officials hope the 2014 count of 2.68 pheasants per mile that was announced a few days ago generates more enthusiasm among hunters and more license sales.

Whether 2.68 this year will be enough to get South Dakotans back into the field isn't predictable.

From 2009 through 2012, as sales to South Dakotans fell below 70,000 three of the four years, the pheasants per mile counts were 6.31, 6.45, 3.85 and 4.19.

What didn't change from 2013 to 2014 along the 110 routes taken for the roadside counts was the prevalence of roosters: 735 last year vs. 731 this year.

Hens went up approximately 55 percent, from 870 to 1,356, and broods of chicks rose 81 percent, from 615 to 1,116. Brood size rose from an average of 5.50 to 5.96.

GFP continues to emphasize the need for dense grasses such as in Conservation Reserve Program acres to provide nesting cover.

A milder winter in some parts of the pheasant range and a smoother spring likely contributed to the rebound, according to

Another possible reason cited by the agency was the return of a solid crop of winter wheat, after the 2012 drought left little wheat cover over the winter of 2012-2013.

Those improved conditions evidently helped more hens survive the winter and successfully nest this spring.

The band of eastern counties around Yankton, Sioux Falls, Brookings, Watertown and Sisseton last year all had roadside counts of less than one bird per mile.

This year they're not better, from a low of 0.77 around Sisseton to a high of 1.36 around Yankton.

Last year none of the 13 areas where roadside counts are taken reached even three birds per mile.

This year Chamberlain leads the way at 6.56, followed by Pierre at 5.20. Winner is at 3.78, Mobridge 3.59 and Mitchell 3.04. Huron was 2.92 and Aberdeen 2.74. Select areas of western South Dakota came in at 1.53.
