Coyotes Earn Costly Paycheck In Loss To Oregon

EUGENE, Ore. — The University of South Dakota football program left the Pacific Northwest with not only a hefty paycheck, but a potentially serious injury to its starting quarterback.

Junior Kevin Earl left Saturday night's matchup with No. 3-ranked Oregon in the third quarter after hitting his right hand on a defender's helmet. Earl was taken into the locker room for an on-site x-ray and was later seen wearing a cast on the hand during the fourth quarter.

Although USD head coach Joe Glenn said in a post-game radio in-

terview that Earl could be out 6-7 weeks, the veteran coach later slowed that prognosis during his media press conference.

"We'll take him back to Sanford (Hospital), where we know they know what's right, and take a look at it there," Glenn said following his team's 62-13 defeat. "The initial diagnosis is that he's got a fracture in his thumb. We'll get the real look at it as soon as we can.'

There was no update on Earl's status Monday.

If that early diagnosis proves to be true. Covote fans will soon get a real look at Ryan Saeger.

The 6-foot-4 sophomore from Hartland, Wisconsin, will inherit an offense that was able to roll up 370 yards against a Pac-12 Conference defense on Saturday night.

Saeger, who missed all of spring drills because of a groin injury, emerged in fall camp as the team's backup quarterback. Prior to Saturday night, Saeger had only served as a holder on extra point and field goal attempts in his previous two full seasons with the program.

In his time on the field Saturday, Earl completed 13-of-26 passes for 136 yards, and led the Coyotes on all three of their scoring drives two Miles Bergner field goals and a Trevor Bouma touchdown run.

Saeger then led the Coyotes on two drives, completing 5-of-8 passes for 62 yards, including a final drive that got all the way down inside the

Oregon 10-vard line before coming up short of scoring.

Not exactly a bad debut, Glenn said later.

"He's very cultured, a very sharp kid. He was a good high school quarterback who can run and throw it," Glenn said. "He just needs to get some reps if he's the guy.

"He'll pick it up in a hurry. We have all the confidence in the world in him."

If Saeger does have to take over for Earl beginning with next Saturday's home opener with NAIA William Penn, the Coyotes may be in luck, according to senior Jasper Sanders. USD, with a stable of four running backs, rushed for 172 yards against the Ducks.

"Saeger's pretty good, but I think we'll be fine running the ball," Sanders said. "We've got a strong running game."

Facing Marcus Mariota

The Coyotes may have gotten an early look at the 2014 Heisman Trophy winner.

Thought by many national outlets to be in the trophy discussion, Oregon junior quarterback Marcus Mariota didn't exactly disappoint in Saturday's game, according to Glenn.

"He's who I thought he was; he's really good," the USD coach said.

Bucks Power Past Mitchell 30-2

MITCHELL — Coming into Yankton's season opener at Mitchell, Bucks head coach Arlin Likness knew his team needed to control the ball and win the turnover battle.

The Bucks were able to accomplish those things, as they thumped the Mitchell Kernels 30-2 in Eastern South Dakota football action on Saturday evening at Joe Quintal Field.

"We didn't play as well as I would have liked," Yankton head coach Arlin Likness said. "But, it was a win and it was a start. We know what we have to work on.'

Mitchell (0-1) started the contest on a roll with three big run plays, however, didn't get anything from it on a missed 17-yard field goal.

'That was really what we prepared for," Mitchell head coach Kent Van Overschelde said. "It seemed like we lost our confidence and really stopped with what we were believing in after that drive."

After that series, Yankton (1-0) looked like a different team.

"That was huge," Likness said. "It gave us great field position and I was on edge after that first possession. That intensified me, which intensified the players.

Deep in their own territory, Mitchell committed the first turnover of the game. Punter Kanin Nelson's punt was blocked, which gave the Bucks the ball on the three yard line.

The ensuing play, senior fullback Jordan Lightner powered his first rushing touchdown of the season. The point after was good from Brady Hale, which gave Yankton a 7-0 lead heading into the second quarter. Halfway through the second quarter, senior corner Ryan Sternhagen snagged an interception from Nelson. This gave Yankton great field position inside the Kernel 20. With 5:55 left in the half, Mason Strahl threw a sniper threw three defenders to Lightner, which doubled the Buck score to 14-0.
