The similarities between the South Dakota State and University of South Dakota football teams are strikingly similar right now. Both sides lost their starting quarterbacks to non-contact injuries in guarantee games last Saturday. And now both schools turn to back-up quarterbacks in this Saturday's home opener against teams that run the triple option. Eerie, huh?

South Dakota State will be without senior quarterback Austin Sumner for somewhere between 5-7 weeks with bone breaks in his right foot. Meanwhile in Vermillion, the Coyotes will be without junior Kevin Earl because of a break in his right thumb.

USD head coach Joe Glenn, who was at Yankton Quarterback Club on Wednesday, was frank in describing what those injuries mean to the Coyotes and Jackrabbits.

## What Now For USD And SDSU?

"They mean about the same," Glenn said. "They're both team captains." Earl could return to the Coyotes within six weeks, Glenn said. That would mean Earl would miss games against William Penn (on Saturday), Montana, Northern Arizona, Southern Illinois and possibly Northern Iowa, at the minimum.

Depending on his healing process and rehabilitation, Earl could return to the field for the Oct. 18 road game at Missouri State.

Sumner, meanwhile, will be out for games against Cal Poly (on Saturday), Southern Utah, Wisconsin-Oshkosh, Illinois State and Missouri State, and possibly more.

I'm not going to debate which injury is worse news for which team, because frankly it's too early, but it's easy to see that USD is better set up in the immediate. Backup quarterback Ryan Saeger will play against NAIA member William Penn on Saturday, which should allow him to build some confidence.

Make no mistake, though, Zach Lujan with the Jackrabbits fared pretty well at Missouri. You'd have to think he wouldn't take a step back against Cal Poly, and could even take a step forward in his progression.

## USD Tennis Coach Gilreath Resigns

VERMILLION — South Dakota head tennis coach Malcolm Gilreath resigned on Wednesday, ending a 10-year run as USD's head coach. He has accepted a non-coaching job in another industry.

Gilreath will leave as the program's winningest coach, finishing with a 122-117 record. He led the program through the Division I transition and coached USD to a 28-24 record and a pair of Summit League Tournament appearances after the transition. Gilreath also coached two All-Summit League performers in Alena Sergeychik (2012) and Yamini Reddy (2013).

"I'd like to thank the student-athletes, the other USD coaches, the athletics staff, our Athletic Director, David Herbstler, and President Jim Abbott for all the wonderful opportunities I had as a part of the Coyote family," Gilreath said. "As I move on, I'll appreciate the times together, and going forward I'll always be a Coyote."

Gilreath's teams were among USD's most suc-

cessful in the classroom. During his tenure, USD tennis has earned the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's (ITA) All-Academic Team award nine times and 37 individuals were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. His teams were also successful at the conference level, as the 2012-13 team earned The Summit League's Team Academic Achievement Award after all 10 members made the league's Commissioner's List of Academic Excellence.

"Malcolm has been a part of the Coyote family for 10 years and he will be missed," Herbstler said. "He has run the program the right way and brought it up to the Division I level. We wish him the best in his new career and thank him for everything he has meant to the program."

A national search for USD's next tennis coach will begin immediately.

A total of three Division I men's basketball game are scheduled for the Pentagon in 2014-15, including a contest featuring Wichita State University and Memphis University on Nov. 18 that will be broadcast by ESPN as part of its College Hoops Tip-Off Marathon. Tickets for all three games are available at ticketmaster.com and the Pentagon box office.

rules."

Softball wasn't the only takeaway from the trip, however.

Orwig and her teammates were able to visit the Terezin Concentration Camp site, Prague Castle, a local brewery and many other historic locations.

"Europe is an older place, with historic sites that are still standing," she said. "Some (towns) even have cobblestone streets, and the

Prague town square is still really old.

"It was a big history lesson." The trip was also a lesson Orwig — a nursing major — can utilize during the remainder of her stay at Mount Marty College, according to her coach.

"Nobody works harder in the classroom," Fernandez said. "As a coaching staff, we'd really like to see her be successful on the field this year."

Orwig, an outfielder, played in 36 games last season as a junior for the Lancers, making 86 at-bats with three runs batted in and

nine walks. "The experience is once in a lifetime for her, and for her to bring that back for her senior year can only help," Fernandez said.

How can that experience help next spring? "Just understanding our resources and how the game is bigger than us," Orwig said. "Sometimes we get so caught up in our own worlds and our own results." "This definitely helped."

each other and both get better.' They do it across the board in all areas."

When there is a conflict between an athlete and a coach, parents will back the coach, something that also helps strengthen a team, according to volleyball coach Susan Johnson.

"The parents here are more apt to take the side of the coach first," she said. "There might be an occasional complaint, but for the most part parents will let kids go through what they need to go through to get better."

Besides learning from parents, many of Crofton's top current athletes also learned from older siblings and relatives. Senior Maria Wort-

mann, who has verbally committed to NCAA Division II Wayne State (Nebraska) for volleyball next fall, has a sister, Laura Morrison, who was a big part of the basketball and track titles in the mid-2000s and is now a part of the teaching staff in Crofton. Another senior, Allison Arens, a University of South Dakota basketball commit, has had both sisters and cousins come through CHS.

"When you're little, you want to play like your older siblings," Wortmann said. "In order to play sports, you have to do well in school. It all pays off."

Allison Arens also credited the "family system. I have older relatives that talked about what it took to get there," she said. "By the time you get there yourself, you're ready."

The student-athletes not only have the willingness to work hard, but the ability to

keep everything in perspective, girls' basketball coach Aaron Losing said.

"Our girls, in general, have their heads screwed on straight," he said. Most of these kids understand that sports is for fun. We have a lot of mature girls come through here, who push themselves to be successful."

## Sharing Talent

In an age of specialization, Crofton has bucked the trend. Wortmann and Arens are in volleyball, basketball and track and field. Fellow senior Quinn Wragge is running cross country this fall, then will join her friends for basketball and track.

Each has one that is her best sport, but make the effort to be in the other sports as well.

"We do it for one another. We're all great friends," Allison Arens said. "If I can help Maria win a volleyball title, I

will, and we will both do anything to win a track title for Quinn. She'll try to help us win another basketball title."

Even when they're not on the same teams, they are out cheering for their schoolmates, Coach Arens noted. "The neat thing about this group is they are supportive all around," she said. "Our cross country girls will go to the volleyball matches. The volleyball girls will come to our meets. They want each other to do well."

Losing and the other coaches try to create an atmosphere where cross-activity participation is encouraged, he said.

"In a small school, that's the way it's always been. You want kids to be active in multiple things," he said. "It's easier to do in a small town because all the programs need the best athletes in order to be successful."

Kramer echoed that state-

ment. "In a school our size, athletes could specialize, but it would take so much away from the other programs. They all play off each other, in a way," she said. "If one athlete would specialize, two other sports would have to plug holes. It helps that everyone is willing to share talent."

The athletes also come into each season energized, according to track and field coach Rod Hegge.

"In those last couple of weeks of the school year, sometimes kids are going through the motions. But these kids, they're fresh," he said. "What these girls have is the will to win. When you have leaders like these, it rubs off on the other kids."

## Out For More

While each of the Crofton coaches is focused on getting better, not necessarily on

hanging another banner in the gym, the pressure is there to continue the success.

"I feel like there is a lot of fear," she said. "We don't want to be that team that fell under pressure."

All three seniors, though, just want to make the most of their final seasons.

"We just want to do our best, have a lot of fun and make a ton of memories," Wragge said. "Hopefully it all turns out awesome."

Regardless of how the school year goals, Allison Arens wants her class to leave a legacy at CHS.

"We want to be that senior class that everyone says, 'They were fun to watch,'" she said.
