Complex, will renovate the second floor of the old high school building. The remodeling will include a state-of-the-art simulation laboratory, classrooms and office space for expanding programs.

Sorenson showed joy contrasting the new science complex with his former office and labs. In Bede Hall, he was so cramped for space, he piled plants wherever possible for botany work. Now, he can step into a heated glass greenhouse and see the campus and neighboring Avera Sacred Heart Hospital (ASHH).

He's betting prospective students and other visitors will also marvel at the new facilities. He still shuddered at the thought of Bede Hall tours.

"Compared to that (past experience), this is gravy," he said, prepared to open the new facilities for visitors. "Showing this facility will be easy. After we tour this (new site), I wish I could take you back to third floor Bede Hall (for a contrast)."

**STRONG PARTNERS**

MMC interim president Tom Lorang welcomed the audience, including the Benedictine Sisters sponsoring both MMC and ASHH.

"We have a long tradition with the Benedictine Sisters of serving health care and education," he said. "The whole country wouldn't be what it is today with education and health care without the Sisters who advanced it."

Lorang saluted the broad range of financial supporters who made the science and nursing complex a reality. "It's a joint venture, and the donors made this happen," he said.

Lorang also saluted the MMC faculty and students in the science, nursing and other health care programs. Nearly half of MMC students enter health fields, but all students will use the new facilities for their graduation requirements.

"The science and nursing programs have been successful," he said. "The impact of our quality students is seen not just here (in Yankton) but across the state and the Midwest."

With its facility upgrades, MMC is ready to take its programs to the next level, Lorang said. "We are good, but now imagine how good we are going to be," he said.

Finally, Lorang expressed gratitude to ASHH, which donated \$750,000 toward the Avera Science and Nursing Complex. He noted the close working relationship between the college and hospital, as a large number of MMC students and graduates work at the hospital.

"Mount Marty College and Avera partner with each other," he said. "Working with Avera, they couldn't be more of a pleasure and more helpful."

ASHH interim CEO Doug Ekeren extended congratulations to the college on behalf of the hospital's board of trustees and its more than 1,200 employees in the Yankton region.

In addition, Ekeren recognized the working relationship between the two Catholic institutions.

"At Avera Sacred Heart Hospital, we have a strong partnership with Mount Marty College. We have many graduates of the college among our employees. We host many students for clinical and other experiences," he said.

"You (MMC) are more than just our neighbor to the west, but a true partner organization, with both of us having roots firmly established by our sponsors. For us, that began 117 years ago when the Benedictine Sisters responded to a request from the bishop to start a hospital."

While Friday's dedication showcased the new facilities, Ekeren noted the true strength will lie with the people inside the buildings.

"While we are here to recognize this important expansion of bricks and mortar," he said, "we also understand that this facility provides the setting for a high quality learning experience for future generations of students."

The new facilities will exert an impact for years to come, Ekeren said.

"This will not only prepare students with the skills necessary for the 21st century employment," he said. "It will also assist us with meeting the workforce demands and opportunities of the greater Yankton region."

The new science complex features the latest safety measures — including the welcome addition of ventilation, Sorenson said.

"In the past, the chemistry and biology departments were on the third floor of Bede Hall," he said. "Above them, we had dorm rooms. When we vented things (in the labs), it went

upstairs (toward the dorm rooms) ... "I think that's why the students were late to class," he added, drawing laughter.

**DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS**

During Friday's program, MMC alumni director Dave Dickes presented the Distinguished Professional Achievement Award to Deb Fischer-Clemens for her health care career. She currently serves as the senior vice president of the Avera Center for Public Policy for Avera Health, based in Sioux Falls.

Fischer-Clemens graduated from MMC in 1977 with a bachelor's degree in nursing. She also holds a master's degree in health services administration from the College of St. Francis in Joliet, Illinois.

"We had planned this (presentation) in June for the all-school reunion, but this worked out much better," Dickes said, referring to Fischer-Clemens' ties to MMC, Avera and health care.

Fischer-Clemens' 35 year health care career with Avera includes 24 years leading a large nursing team in direct patient care.

"I am extremely honored," she said. "This is extremely special. It means so much to have my whole career ... with Avera. I'm still a nurse, I'm a nurse first and an advocate second."

Fischer-Clemens has worked extensively with public policy. She served as a state legislator from 1995-2000. She works with state and national legislators and public officials in four states. Her committees and advocacy work includes prescription drug monitoring, Medicaid long-term solutions and the reduction of infant mortality and youth tobacco use. She is also an advocate for immigrants, women and children.

Fischer-Clemens credited her MMC education as the foundation for her career and life success.

"I do believe it all goes back to starting at Mount Marty College and what I learned from the Sisters," she said. "They encouraged us to be risk takers, and they set an example. It's a role in what I enjoy every day."

The program included prayer and dedication by the MMC chaplain, the Rev. Thomas Wordekemper; readings and prayers by Sister Penny Bingham of Sacred Heart Monastery and MMC trustee John Osnes; and special music by the MMC music department.

**TAKING THE TOUR**

During Friday's tours, former MMC trustee Jim Wintz of Hartington, Nebraska, said he was impressed with the facility. The upgrades should benefit student recruitment and provide more health care workers for the region, he said.

"It's something they have been working on for a long time. It's a much needed addition to the facility," he said. "The board and (chief advancement officer) Barb Rezac have been driving this for a long time. Without the generosity of the community, there's no way this would have been done."

Friday's dedication and tours carried special meaning for Yankton resident Dee Smith and her son, Matt Smith of Knoxville, Tennessee. They donated to the new facility, and a room was named for their late husband and father, Thane Smith.

The Smiths lived on the East Coast until Thane Smith, a research physicist, was hired by M-Tron. The family moved to Yankton 19 years ago, and Thane Smith died four years ago.

Dee Smith served three years on the MMC Gregorian Club advisory board, promoting the fine arts on campus. She has remained an advocate for education and formerly served as assistant director for the Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health facility.

"We were approached by the college, and donating to the science lab seemed like a good opportunity with Thane's science background," Dee said.

The Smiths said they were pleased with the finished science center.

"This will be wonderful for Mount Marty," Dee said. "I think it will attract new students." Matt stood quietly, looking around and reflecting on his late father.

"This is the state of the art, true 21st century," he said. "My father would be very impressed with it. It seems like a fitting tribute to him."

Speakers at the conference included Merriman; Dr. Priscilla Romkema, the first-ever female Black Hills State University (BHSU) dean of the College of Business and Natural Sciences; Kari Karst, president of BX Civil & Construction of Dell Rapids; Dr. Bobbi Looney, BHSU School of Business assistant professor; and Kristi Palecek, general manager of Yankton's TruXedo, Inc.

"This was a six month process to plan and identify our speakers," Merriman said. "We are so pleased with who we were able to line up, and that we were able to include (Palecek) from the local area."

Palecek, the only female general manager among Yankton's 26 manufacturing facilities, spoke on embracing opportunity. Explaining during her speech that she feels a lot of women in business sell themselves short and deny themselves opportunities to succeed in their chosen fields.

"How many of you have ever said no, without guilt, when asked to serve on a board, a community group a church group?" she asked the attendees of the conference.

"You say yes without thinking - you don't even think about how it is going to affect your family, your finances, your time. Yet, when approached to accept a work opportunity, we feel guilty accepting."

She said that in the Midwest, many females have been taught gender roles and those

stereotypes change impressions on what is an acceptable role for females in the workplace. Palecek explained that growing up, her mother and her aunt broke those stereotypes and were strong influences on her future success in the work force.

"I grew up knowing it was OK for a girl to mow, split wood, use a wrench, put air in a tire, be a supervisor in a manufacturing environment," she said. "I grew up living the attitude of Rosie (the Riveter) - if you tell me I can't do something, I am going to do it, just to show that I can."

Rosie the Riveter - the symbol of Friday's conference - is a cultural icon, representing the American women who worked in factories during World War II. Currently, Rosie is commonly used as a symbol of women's economic power. Saying that empowering females to know they can succeed in whatever field they choose begins at a young age, Palecek noted that women who have achieved success in business must become role models for young girls.

She added that women need to get over the need to be perfect, pointing out that men have more self-confidence in the work place.

"Women feel confident only when perfect," Palecek said. "I would rather be 80 percent right and take a chance, than wait until I am 100 percent right and never speak up."

Noting that perseverance, balancing work and family, and challenging yourself are keys to success, she added that women can't be afraid to try or be afraid of negative comments.

"Women need to learn to receive negative feedback without getting defensive," Palecek said. "We need a good sounding board to get realistic answers. Let people express their opinions and thoughts. Try to understand what they are saying. Ask questions, paraphrase back to them, make sure you understand their concerns, and then evaluate. But most importantly, quit taking it personally."

She stressed the need to put comments in perspective, asking: Is this a problem about me, or the other person? How important is the issue? Do I want to address it?

No matter what, though, she stressed how important it is to look to the future.

"You need to seize your opportunities to be role models," she said. "You could be shaping the future. Your actions speak louder than words."

Merriman said that SD CEO would like to do another conference in Yankton in the future.

"We are very strategic about where we do our conferences," she said. "This is a fantastic network for women. Women bring so much to the table, that being able to connect across the state helps us all learn and get better."
